This directory will be distributed free of charge to welfare workers, the clergy, and key lay people throughout the County who would best be able to make use of such information.

Bursting Growth
Formed early last fall, the Halton Community Welfare Council came into being as a direct result of the bursting growth within Halton County. As the population increased, it was felt that there was a great need for a common meeting ground of all welfare, health, social and government agencies and interested citizens where the overall effort in social and recreational lines might be co-ordinated within our community.

By meeting monthly, it is hoped that a clear picture of community needs and facilities will emerge, and a more efficient and beneficial service may thus be rendered to the people. A medium such as this, through which common problems may be discussed and solved, will be of great benefit to member organizations.

60th Jubilee For Boer Vets

Three Acton men have received invitations to the second and last reunion of Canada's Boer War veterans, who will be the guests of the city of Toronto and province of Ontario from May 22 to May 24. The event commemorates the 60th jubilee of their service.

South African veterans in town are Wilfred Coles, with the Prince Albert's Somersetshire Light Infantry from 1897 to 1902; Claude Gray with the Canadian army and Ernest George Sheppard of South Wales Borderers.

Another veteran, Charles Withers, died last week at 83 years of age.

On Sunday, May 22, there will be a special commemorative service, on Monday the 23rd sight-seeing bus trips, reception and laying of wreaths of the South African monument, and a garden party. On Tuesday the 24th there will be a civic banquet.

Buy Jersey Calves at Hays

Ernest Alexander of Norval, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mac Alexander, is one of the outstanding 4-H members in Halton County, and at the Hays Sales Arena on Monday last week he purchased two Jersey calves.

From the herd of R. Stenger and Son, Enniskillen, he bought the senior calf, Enniskillen Sixth Fairy, for \$140. She is a daughter of the famous sire, Brampton Sixth Generation, a Silver medal and Superior sire, that won the Senior Get of Sire at Chicago in 1958 and many other prizes for his offspring at the Royal Winter Fair.

The dam of Sixth Fairy is classified Excellent. She has three records and she is a daughter of the tested sire, Brampton B.P. Servant, former grand champion at the Canadian National Exhibition and other fairs. He already has a high rating for both production and classification on his daughters.

is owned by the Central Ontario A-1 Unit at Maple, Ont., and he is a Gold and Silver medal superior sire. In 1958 and 1959 he won the Senior Get of Sire at the Royal Winter Fair. So Ernest has an eye for type and production.

Mr. Alexander, Ernest's father, paid \$140 for a daughter of Brampton Carom Beacon from the herd of B. H. Bull and Son, known as Brampton Raining Carom. The dam has a record. She is classified Very Good. She was imported from Jersey Island and she has another tested daughter.

Another Halton County Jersey herd is that owned by Fred Nurse of R. R. 2, Georgetown. Fred purchased Fairmount Bijou Moneta from George Innes, Woodstock, Ont. This senior calf is by Brampton Sir Bijou Radar, a Silver medal and Superior sire, formerly in the herd of Maurice G. Beatty, Milton, now owned by the Oxford Artificial Unit at Woodstock. The dam of Moneta is classified Excellent and has three records. She is by the Superior sire, Brampton Jett, Beacon.

William H. Devlin of Milton consigned a junior heifer calf to the sale and this calf sold for \$75 to Lorne Carson, Clowery, Ont.

America's Holstein Breed Association Is World's Largest

How livestock breeders have become more and more pure bred minded over the years is illustrated by the growth of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America, the largest pure bred cattle society in the world.

It took 40 years, from 1885 to 1925, to register the first million Holstein females. Number 2,000,000 came 14 years later; then number 3,000,000 nine years later; then number 4,000,000 after a seven year interval. Now number 5,000,000 has been recorded, less than five years after the four millionth registration.

Over 50 per cent. of the pure bred dairy cattle registered in the U.S.A. last year were Holsteins. This compares with 75 per cent. Holstein registrations in Canada.

Separate Insurance For 19-Year-Olds

Many parents still do not realize that their dependent children no longer have hospital insurance with the family after they reach age 19. According to the Ontario Hospital Services Commission, some young people aged 19 are found to be uninsured when they are admitted for hospital treatment.

About 77,000 children in Ontario will reach age 19 this year, and while many of them will become insured on their own through becoming employed in insured groups, others must arrange to pay premiums directly to the Commission or they will be uninsured when the need arises.

Care should be taken to act promptly to keep insured. Application forms are available at all hospitals, most banks, or any office of the Ontario Hospital Services Commission.
