Tips on Touring

Like picnics? Here are some of the latest gadgets that will make your next outing easier for you and more fun for your family.

Get off the grass with the smallest camp-stool ever made. The whole thing folds flat and compact enough to fit into your purse, coat pocket or car's glove compartment. With a steel frame

and canvas seat, it's plenty sturdy.

Griddle Feeds Six
How about a heavy aluminum griddle, 16 inches across? It holds steaks or fish to feed six hungry picnickers. It had a wooden handle that guarantees cool fingers and toads over for easy packing.

Like coffee en route? Then pick up an eight-cup coffee pot that has plugs for both car lighter socket and house current. It comes in a kit with cups, saucers, spoons, carrying case. The pot has a bracket so you can hang it on the car window.

If you picnic far from the car, you might like a seven-cup

coffee maker that burns propane. The fuel tank fits right under the handle. It makes coffee in about ten minutes.

Bane to Kiddies
Your children will hate you for this! A leak-proof, two and a half gallon water tank comes equipped with a shallow basin, brush, soap and towels.

And finally, if you camp out for any length of time, you may want a two-burner stove that carries six pounds of propane fuel in a refillable tank. It holds enough fuel for over a week of cooking, and the tanks can be filled again for about one dollar at any propane station.

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
