

Your attention is drawn to section 5 of By law No. 903 which governs the collection of garbage in the Town of Arton

This section sets but the amount of garbage which shall be collected from each property or family as follows

Your co-operation is requested to adverting to those productions as they will be struitly enforced

- 1. No more than five (5) containers for each family living in one dwelling or from each assessed property.
- 2. No container or bundle to weigh more than fifty pounds.
- 3. All garbage or refuse to be in proper containers.
- 4. All bundles to be a maximum of four (4) feet in length and not weigh more than fifty (50) pounds.
- 5. All empty cartons to be broken down and securely tied.
