

Bank Announces Plan For School Awards

MONTREAL — The Bank of Montreal has inaugurated a seven-year scholarship program to provide university training in arts and science for outstanding Canadian high-school graduates in all 10 provinces, according to an announcement at the weekend by G. Arnold Hart, B of M president.

The first project to be announced by any Canadian organization for the observance of Canada's Centennial in 1967, the plan provides for 50 top high-school graduates to enter university on B of M scholarships next autumn. The program will culminate in 1967, Canadian centennial year and 150th anniversary of the establishment of the bank. Mr. Hart said, with the conferring of centennial awards on the top scientist and the top humanist.

To be known as "Bank of Montreal Canada Centennial Scholarships."

Meet Bing

Farm News

Crop Improvement Association Plans Spring Program for Halton

The Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association, in cooperation with farmers in Halton county, are conducting several crop projects. Many of these are being carried out during the spring seeding.

In project work, the association co-operates with the Field Crops Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, and the Field Husbandry and Soils Departments at the Ontario Agricultural College. The program is under the general supervision of agricultural representative J. Allen Francis of the Extension Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture.

Plan Program

This year's program stresses fertility trials, variety demonstrations, chemical weed control and management practices. Reports indicate that several farmers in Halton will be using 2, 4-D.B. in chemical weed control this year.

Because of this, the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association is including two demonstrations using this method of weed control. 2, 4-D.B. is used for weed spraying of fields that are seeded with legume and grasses.

It should be stressed that 2, 4-D.B. is actually a different product than 2, 4-D. In 2, 4-D.B., the 'D' stands for butyric acid, as differing from acetic acid in 2, 4-D. The butyric form doesn't kill any plants. The acetic acid, as in 2, 4-D, kills or injures those plants susceptible to 2, 4-D, including alfalfa.

Certain plants, including a long list of weeds very similar to the list of weeds controlled by 2, 4-D, within their own system convert the butyric in 2, 4-D.B. to acetic, and so are controlled in the same way as if 2, 4-D had been used. Certain other plants, alfalfa and birdsfoot trefoil among them, cannot convert butyric to acetic, and so are not killed.

It is important, however, that spraying of alfalfa be carried out at the proper stage of growth. This is when the alfalfa is in the first trifoliate leaf.

No Crop Damage

As a result, weed problems in alfalfa can be handled with 2, 4-D.B. with practically no crop damage. Rates of 2, 4-D.B. can be from 16 to 24 ounces of acid per acre, compared to a maximum of two ounces on 2, 4-D which can be used on alfalfa and then only if the weed problem is extreme.

As with any selective weed killer, however, there are some weeds that cannot be readily controlled by this method. In using 2, 4-D.B., be sure to step up the gallonage, spraying at rates from 20 to 30 gallons per acre.

With 2, 4-D.B., it is possible to obtain better establishment of alfalfa and clovers by reducing the weed competition, without the usual crop setback associated with 2, 4-D sprays.

The weed spraying demonstrations and other projects will be used by the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association during 1960 in their Twilight Meetings and crop tours.

The BIBLE Today

The translation of the Bible into new languages is always a live subject. Recently the British and Foreign Bible Society reported that a first Bible in Lushai for Assam had been issued. There are also two first New Testaments in Gange for Burma and Quechua — Avacuco for Peru; the latter in conjunction with the American Bible Society.

Two first productions of any part of the Bible in Deisan for Borneo and Riang for India have also been made. Altogether, at present, 319 languages are being worked on in the translations department.

The effect of having the scriptures in a man's own language is illustrated by the comment from an Aymara village in South America when they received the fully revised translation of the scriptures in their own tongue. One of the translators said: "Since the Good News came to us, it is as though Jesus Christ were living in our village."

50 SCHOLARSHIPS OF \$750 ...

In a nationwide competition opening this week, 50 of the most promising young Canadian men and women, graduating from high school this June, will be awarded Bank of Montreal Scholarships, valued at \$750 each, for entrance to first-year University next autumn.

These young Canadians will be drawn from all of the ten provinces according to population, with a minimum of two scholarship students from each province.

They will be judged by independent University Selection Committees on the basis of academic standing and character. They will enter a Canadian university of their choice as Bank of Montreal Scholarship Students to pursue studies in Arts or Science. Professional courses, such as law, medicine and engineering, are not included. *B of M Scholarship Students may hold other monetary scholarships for the first year only.*

24 FELLOWSHIPS OF \$3,000 ...

In the Spring of 1961, the top eight of these 16 students will each be awarded a B of M Scholarship of \$3,000 for one year's study anywhere in Canada or abroad.

In 1965 and 1966, provided a satisfactory standard of work has been maintained, these same students will each be awarded a B of M Scholarship of \$3,000 per annum for further study leading to their Doctorate.

2 BANK OF MONTREAL CANADA CENTENNIAL AWARDS OF \$5,000 ...

In 1967, to culminate this seven year plan, the two top students — one in Arts and one in Science — will be chosen, from all 50 participants in the plan, to receive the Bank of Montreal Canada Centennial Awards of \$5,000 each for a further year of study anywhere in Canada or abroad.

Thus, to each of these two winners — if they have been participants throughout the plan — the Bank will have provided financial assistance amounting to \$19,250.

In the Spring of 1961, the top 16 of these 50 students will each be awarded a B of M Scholarship of \$1,500 for second year university training.

In 1962 and 1963, provided at least good second class grades have been maintained, these same students will each be awarded a B of M Scholarship of \$1,500 per annum ... leading to graduation in 1964.
