Industrial-Commercial

May 4: After three years of waiting, Captain Sir 'Arry' Rogers is a proud man, yes sir. His Jolly Rogers finally copped the Industrial-Commercial league title. Finishing out their final three games of a six game go with the total pinfall to count, the Rogers rolled three steady games of 1088-1065-1088 to add 3241 to their previous total of 3622 to become champions by 141 pins from the runner-up, A-1 Delivery. The big quartette for the champs were Jeff Fryer 704, Bob Agnew 682, Wilo Near 649 and Arlie White 638. A-1 Delivery made their usual fighting finish with their 3130 pinfall to make their total 6122. Trying hard to bring the A-1 Delivery home in front were Dec DeForest 613, Carl DeForest 624, Had DeForest 605 and Bob Taylor 618.

Taxi and Woodcraft

Reliable Taxi ran into headpin trouble and their 3057 pinfall rounded out a 6064 count. Leo McGilgowsky 642, Fred Kentner 628 and Ches Pechya with 662 were the top trio for the Taxi. It fell to the lot of Action Woodcraft to hit the skids. Going into the final set with a 72-pin lead, the "wood butchers" saw it disappear but good as Lady Luck was in one of her fickle moods and looked the other way. Their final total count saw them plummet down to the last spot. Bill Johnstone with 623 was the top trundler and sad to say, that sums up the Woodcraft's trundling.

Acton Major

May 5: Well, the Nicol's Tiger Cats are still champions of the Acton Major league. In a five-game final, total pins to count, it was a snarling bunch of Cats who went into an early lead, saw it fade away, then roared back in typical Tiger Cat fashion in the last game to retain their title and make them champs for the fourth consecutive season.

Tough Loss

It was a tough decision for the Acton Billiards to lose. A first time starter in the Majors, the Billiards, composed mostly of rookies, pulled an upset in the semi-final when they defeated the highly rated Casarin Flyers, and on the strength of this, no one was selling them short in the finals.

Close Games

The first game saw the Cats jump into a 214-pin lead. Terry added to this in the second by 15 pins. The third game saw the Cats win of fortune going the Billiards way by 17 pins. The fourth chucker was all Acton Billiards when, paced by the veteran Cy Ryan, the tyros came up with the best game of the series, 1213, to go into the last game 20 pins up. Excitement rose to a fever pitch with the spectators urging the Billiards on to end the reign of the Cats. 'Twas not to be, however, although Wayne Spines unwound with a 301 effort for the "cue" boys. The Cats pulled the steadily ahead to win the game by 111 pins and the round by 91. Upset in Sixth

It was in the sixth and final game that the upset came. The highly rated Broken Arrows had finished out their game with an 1130 effort and their six game total of 6504 looked good enough to clinch the title. Eagles had flown the coop with an 1129 for a total of 6391. Bombs' 973 game for a total of 6277 wrote finis for them. Jesters, although out of it, still came up with an 1102 for a total of 6044. Rascals' 861, to round out their total of 5770, had it. Jokers were the last team to finish and it was here the fireworks started to bang out.

Fireworks Start

To start, Elton MacDonald hit for 242, Elsie Whitham followed with 289. Bob Martin muttered his way into a 253, Ron Whitham was satisfied with his 252, and Bud MacDonald came through like all anchor men should with a neat 282 for a hot 1318 game, boosting their total to a 6635. This gave the jubilant Jokers the championship by 131 pins. It was a tough one for the Arrows to lose but the Jokers deserve full credit for their win, in refusing to concede defeat, and in coming from behind with an outstanding last game performance. They proved their right to be champions.

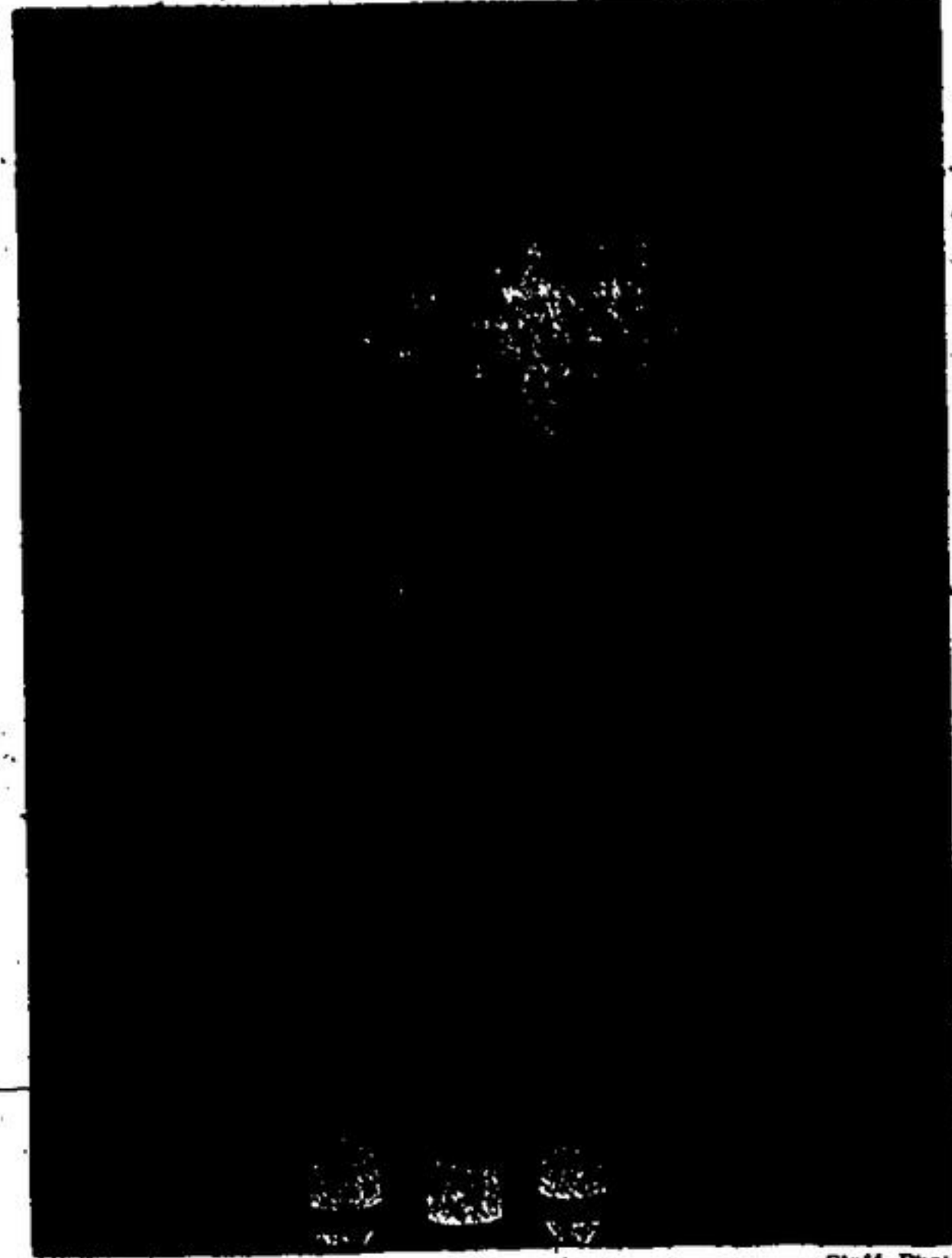
Raiders-Eagles Play Close
