

GARBAGE COLLECTION

Your attention is drawn to section 5 of By law No. 903 which gover a thing collection of garbage in the Town of Acton.

This section sets out the amount of garbage which shall be referred to m each property or family as follows -

Your co-operation is requested in adhering to these previous is "17 will be strictly enforced

- 1. No more than five (5) containers for each family living in one dwelling or from each assessed property.
- 2. No container or bundle to weigh more than fifty pounds.
- 3. All garbage or refuse to be in proper containers.
- 4. All bundles to be a maximum of four (4) feet in length and not weigh more than fifty (50) pounds.
- 5. All empty cartons to be broken down and securely tied.
