First of 40,000 Trees

Begin Planting Hornby Farm

The first of 40,000 trees was planted at the John Coulson farm, Hornby, on Friday morning as Halton County took the initial step toward a reforestation showplace.

Mrs. Maggie Preston, 85, planted the first tree in memory of her deceased brother, who left the 92 acre estate to the county in his will. County Council agricultural committee members and Forestry officials were also on hand to witness the ceremony.

Maintain 50 Years
A known tree and nature lover, the late Mr. Coulson willed 92 acres of his farm to the county on the stipulation the property be planted with trees. The county committee arranged with the department to plant the trees and maintain the site for 50 years.

The planting of the first tree was carried out under heavy rain and extremely muddy conditions. Roger Cunningham, zone forester for Halton and Wellington counties, said that 36,000 of the trees will be alternate spruce and pine and the 4,000 remaining trees will be hardwood including oak, ash and walnut. Warden Doug Sargent climbed into the tractor-drawn planter and planted a short row of trees.

Left in Estate
The land was willed to the county in 1956 and reforestation began this year. The remaining eight acres of the Coulson farm were left to the estate and sold to Snow Construction of Oakville.

A reception at the Milton Inn following the planting ceremony. The department supervisor of the Lake Huron District, J. Steele, spoke to about 30 guests at the luncheon. He said it was a marvellous thing that this "outstanding gift" was set aside for a perpetual forest. It could be good for agricultural land but man does not live by food alone.

Marvellous Vision
"We must have forests to provide land which could lead into recreational facilities for the future. Mr. Coulson must have had a marvellous vision," he said.

Roger Cunningham remarked, "In future it will be one of the most scenic spots in this area." Stanley Hall, M.P.P. for Halton, said he had known Mr. Coulson for many years. He congratulated the county council and its agricultural committee in saving they have done a useful job and he congratulated them on what they will be able to do with this property.

Praise Family
A neighbor of the Coulsons, Fred Wigglesworth, said Mr. Coulson came there 82 years ago. The Coulsons worked hard, he said, and saved their money. They had big hearts and that is why the county got this gift.

Fred Near, agricultural committee chairman of county council, said they did their utmost to cooperate with the Department of Lands and Forests. He said they have turned over management of the farm to the department for 50 years. "We plan to make this farm one of the showplaces of Halton," he noted.

George Currie, former member of the agricultural committee, recalled the Cox farm purchase in Nassagaweya township in 1937 for reforestation. The county now owns over 1,200 acres under forest.

Milton's Deputy Reeve Mary S. Pettit said she was proud to be a county councillor to take part in this occasion. "Trees take a long time to grow, but they live with us forever," she concluded.

Ask Stricter Farm Pond Safety County Views Hospital Grants

A recent drowning of a swimmer in a Peel County farm pond has prompted Halton County Council to adopt strict measures for farm pond safety, it was revealed Tuesday afternoon at the May meeting of council.

Council adopted an agriculture committee report urging that farm pond owners adopt one or two of the following safety measures in their ponds: either a log be placed in the pond, a dock be erected, a safety preserver be made available, or a cable strung from one side of the pond to the other. The committee noted a drowning recently occurred when a swimmer could not climb up the steep bank of a pond.

Contact Owners
Agricultural Representative J. A. Francis, a member of the farm ponds committee, was asked to draw up these safety measures and contact those who have received a county grant for a pond.

A discussion was held on whether or not the farm ponds committee should continue its work, and it was eventually agreed that the committee is serving a very worthwhile purpose in its jurisdiction over construction of farm ponds. Officers elected for the year 1960-61 were all returned from last year—chairman George Currie, vice-chairman Deputy Reeve F. J. Near, secretary-treasurer J. A. Francis, and auditor Cecil Dobic.

Grant Too High
During a discussion on hospital grants, Nassagaweya Deputy Reeve A. R. Service questioned a county grant of \$6,000 a bed on hospital additions. The grant, he noted, was based on a \$12,000 per bed cost in construction, but an addition could be constructed for less, and the county's grant should be based on only \$10,000 per bed.

Plans were made for a visit of the Wellington County agriculture committee to Halton on June 15, when guests could make a tour of some conservation projects in the county, and be entertained at a luncheon.
