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### Halton Eleventh In '59 Accidents

Only 10 out of 54 counties reported more accidents in 1959 I than Halton County which ranks 11th, reporting 1,889. York County, which is more built up than any other county, reports 22,675 accidents. These figures were issued in the Ontario Depart. ment of Transport's "Accident ies of motor vehicle traffic accidents.

25 Fatals Out of 25 latal accidents in Halton, 28 people died. Out of 416 accidents involving personal miury, 649 persons were injured. Property damage from the 1,889 total accidents affected 1,448 persons. The location of all accidents on urban and rural
