

London Woman is Killed Near Speyside Saturday

A London woman died and her friend suffered minor injuries as their car missed the curve on No. 25 Highway, just south of Speyside at about 3.25 a.m. Saturday. The deceased was Mrs. Laraine Verrault, 37, who drove the 1958 Meteor coach south on the highway until she missed the turn of the road. The car hit the curvy, which sent it skidding off the highway sideways 103 feet where it then hit a clump of earth and stones turning the vehicle over. The two women were thrown free of the car and both car and occupants landed in the ditch. The passenger was Mrs. Alberta Rhyness, 37, of Huntsville who was taken to hospital suffering minor injuries. Damage to the car was estimated at \$1,500. North Halton Constable Bill Bennett investigated at the death scene.

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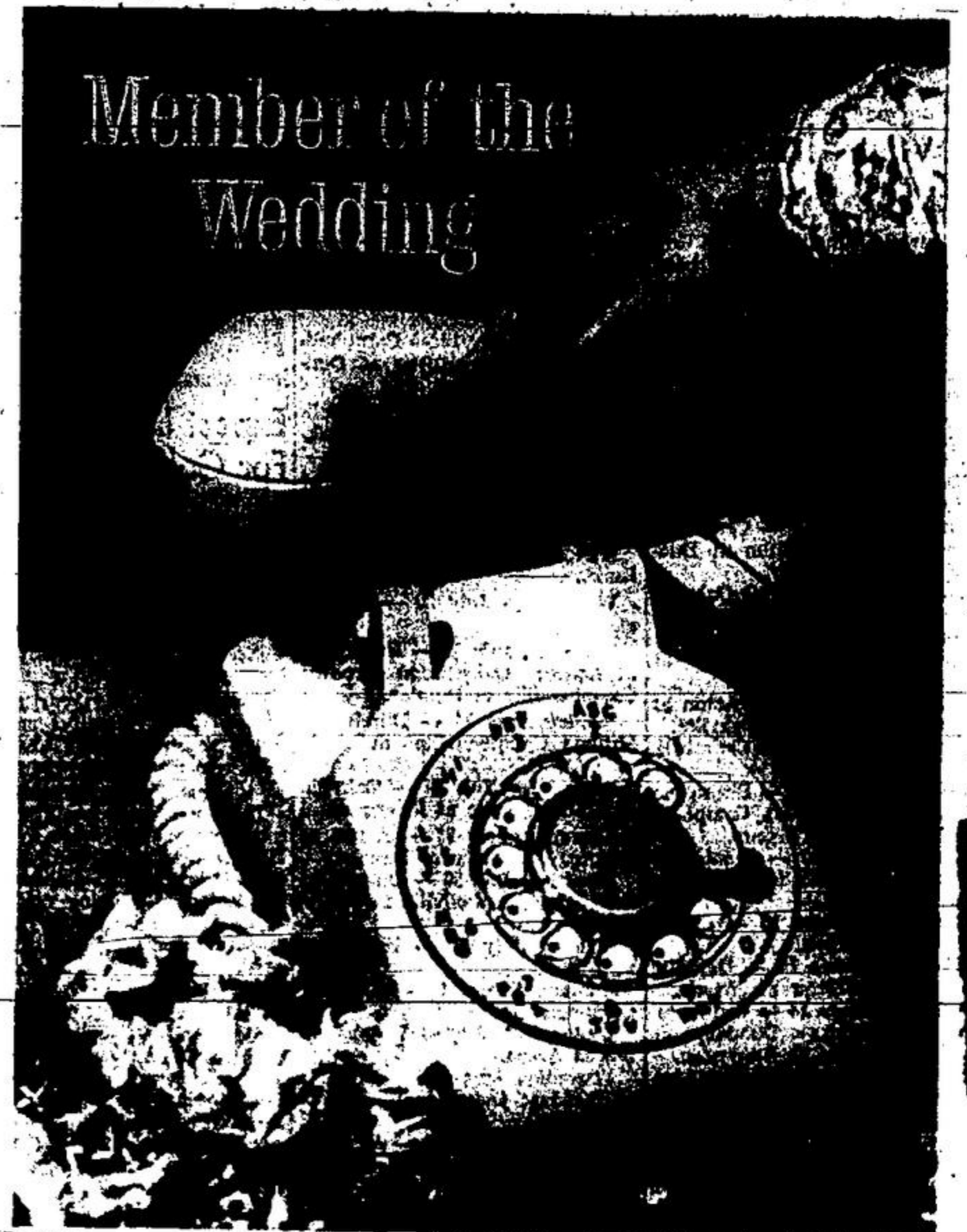

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Guest Speaker Outlines Teachers' Duties at Meet

Padre W. Young of the Guelph O.A.C. told the principals of Halton Inspectorate No. 1 that training was for animals and education for children, when he addressed them at their dinner meeting Wednesday evening at the Robert Little public school in Acton.

Rev. Young, speaking to the principals and their wives, stressed the teachers' responsibilities and outlined the educational system and what is expected of teachers.

He noted that in a few years people would be able to look back on 1960 as being one of the cheaper years in education. He said that presently it was costing approximately \$50 per person but in the future, the expense would be greater.

Important Features Good buildings, text books and curriculum were pointed out as important features of education but the speaker told his audience if a poor teacher was associated with a school, only mediocre work would be done by the pupils.

Rev. Young stressed the characteristics of a good teacher and said qualifications were the love

of children, an abundance of patience, a sense of humor and a knowledge of how to discipline both the minds and bodies of pupils and how to motivate and inspire them.

The speaker noted that one of the frustrating aspects of teaching was they never knew the fruits of their labor.

Build Character In conclusion, he told his interested audience it was not important to keep up to Russia by building bombs and weapons of war but to build the proper character in the future citizens — the children.

Following his talk, the speaker was presented with a gift on behalf of the association.
