Laurence Duby, who hopes to become an Anglican priest, will take arts at Trinity College, U. of T.

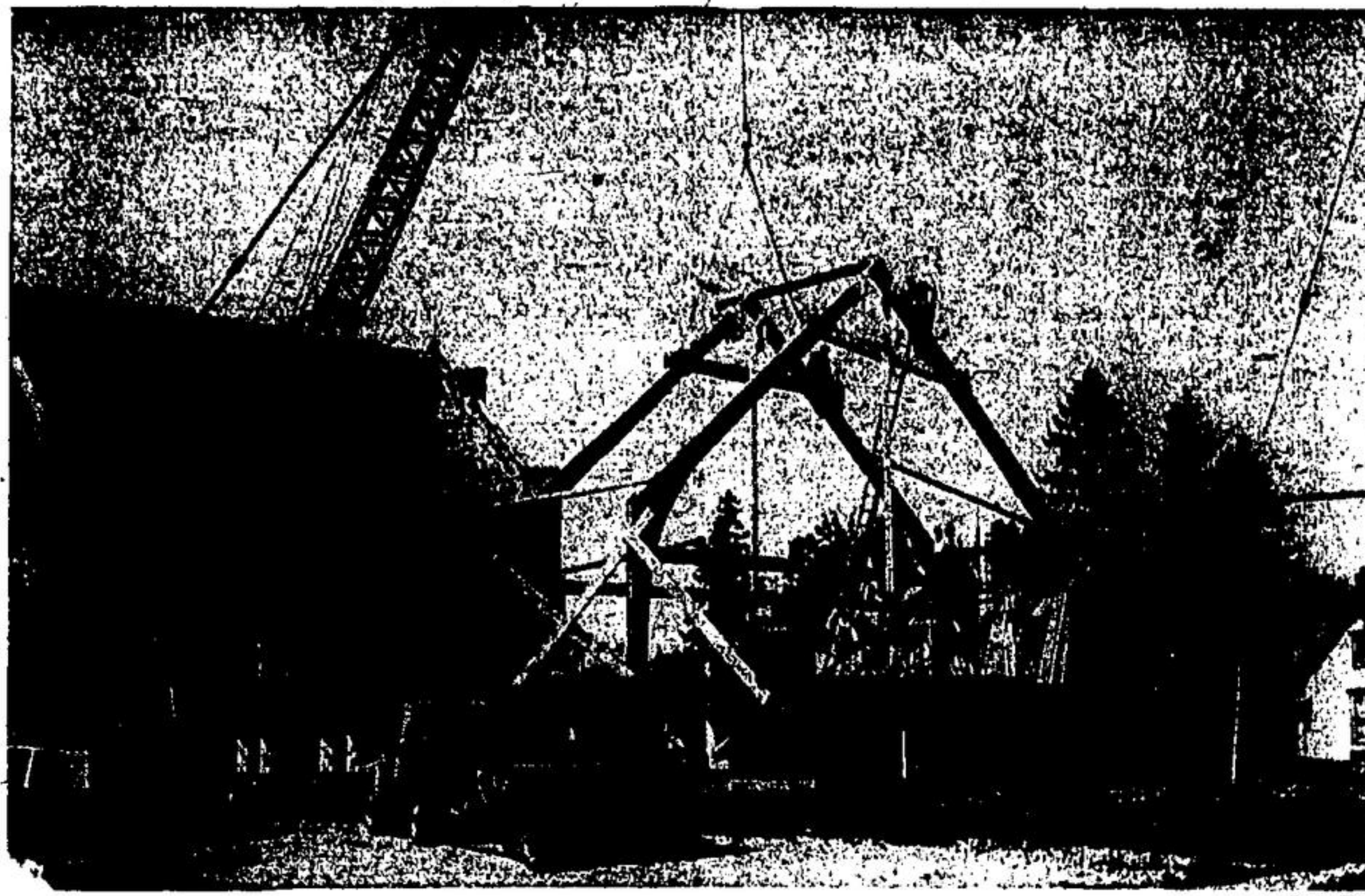
Brian Gervais and Louise Wasowicz will go to Teachers' College. Mike Homer will likely study under a Navy training plan.
