LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Select Committee on Automobile Insurance

On April 5th, 1960, the Legislative Assembly of Ontario appointed a Select Committee "to examine, investigate, enquire into, study and report on all matters relating to persons who suffer financial loss or injury as a result of motor vehicle accidents and, without restricting the generality of the foregoing, including all matters relating to:

1. Financial responsibility of operators and owners of motor vehicles;
2. The payment of claims inclusive of unsatisfied judgments and others, and also including the operation and coverage of the Unsatisfied Judgment Fund;
3. All aspects of compulsory insurance and other related and relevant plans, including the experience of other jurisdictions;
4. The operation of existing legislation and procedures in Ontario.

And to make such recommendations as are deemed advisable with respect thereto. The Committee invites representations from parties interested in any or all aspects of the foregoing terms of reference. Such representations should be in the form of written briefs, twenty-five copies of which should be submitted to the Secretary of the Committee not later than September 15th, 1960. An opportunity will be given at a later date for those making submissions to appear in person before the Committee.
