Township Rejects Dam Share Says Ratepayers Won't Benefit

Esqueving council on Monday officially turned down the request of the Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authority for a share in the \$325,000 Kelso dam on the Sixth Line, Nassagaweya.

By resolution, the council felt the proposed distribution of costs was unfair to township taxpayers, as a majority of township ratepayers in the watershed area would receive no benefits from the proposed water storage and conservation parklike.

The dam will be erected near the Nassagaweya Sixth Line and the creek below the dam flows through the south-western corner of Esqueving into Milton, Trafalgar and Oakville. All five municipalities have been asked to share the costs, and Esqueving's levy was set at \$10,887. All other municipalities have approved their levies, totalling nearly 90 per cent. of the cost.

Field trips for rural public schools of Nassagaweya Township have been arranged to one of the Halton County Forests by the Lake Huron District Tree Farm Board. The tours will be conducted by a professional forester of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests.

Last week there was consternation at the announcement the Ruxy Theatre would be closing for the season. However, Thursday manager Murray Harrison was surprised as his customers to learn the decision had been reversed, and the silver screen won't suffer a blackout after all.
