**Links With 401 Get Preference**

Wellington County roads giving connection with Highway 401 are top-ranking among nine roads suggested as possible development roads by the Ontario Government.

Wellington road committee set out the nine road arrangements, which actually had been originally recommended by the county engineer, W. H. Keith, in connection with needs for future development and operations.

**Northern Route**  
Some members of council felt that first preference should be given to county roads 88, 60 and 69 which extend from Ferguson to Rockwood via the Shand Dam. These will provide for traffic from all of the northern areas to Highway 401.

Second preference to some was on county road 50 which extends from the Wentworth County boundary to Guelph which is expected to take care of anticipated developments resulting from Highway 401 and expansion of the city. This road is actually a continuation of Highway 52 which extends from Highway 52 to the Wentworth County line.

Other roads which it is hoped one day will be taken over by the Ontario Government as development roads are: county road 81 from Elora to the Waterloo County line to take care of conditions resulting from the development of Elora Gorge Park.

**From Belwood**  
County road 64 from Ferguson to the Durham County boundary to care for increased and increasing traffic resulting from the Grand River Conservation Commission dam and lake at Belwood.

County road 55 from Mount Forest to Highway 23 via Harrison to extend the Shelburne-Mount Forest road to a logical terminus.

County road 65 from Erin to the Halton County boundary, of which two miles is already approved by the government as development road.

County road 93 from Highway 86 to county road 52 via Yattson and Glen Allan to take care of development resulting from the Grand River Conservation Commission dam and lake on the Conestogo River.
