

OPP Figures Prove May is Black Month

May was a black month for 35 people who were killed as a result of traffic deaths in OPP districts in Ontario. There were 44 fatal accidents and 9,980 charges were laid.

The Dundas district led the way with 10 deaths. The OPP reported 628 persons charged with careless driving, 1,956 charged with rules of the road, 29,630 persons warned, 176 persons charged with impaired driving, 91 charged with driving while intoxicated. Total number of accidents in the OPP districts are reported to be 1,964 with 761 injuries.
