RASPBERRY JELLY (Using red raspberries)

Yield: about 8 medium glasses

8 cups juice (about 2 quarts ripe red rasporries) S cups (21 lbs.) sugar

34 bottle Certo fruit pectin First, prepare the juice. Crush thoroughly about 2 quarts fully ripe red raspberries. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 3 cups into a large sauce-

pan. (If berries lack tartness, substitute 2 tablespoons lemon juice for 2 tablespoons of the fruit Then make the jelly. Add sugar to juice in saucepan and mix well.
Place over high heat and bring to a

boil, stirring constantly. At once stir in Certo. Then bring to a full rolling boil, and boil hard I minute. stirring constantly. Remove from beat, skim off foam with metal spoon, and pour quickly into glasses. Cover jelly at once with 1/4 inch bot paraffin.

Tart jams or jellies are delicious accompaniments to meat and poultry. Try raspberry or cherry jam or jelly with chicken or turkey; gooseberry or rhubarh jam with pork; grape or plum jelly with lamb.
