Dude Lindsay was in top form Tuesday evening when he hurled the Station Hotel team to a 15-2 victory over the Legion entry in the Acton softball league.

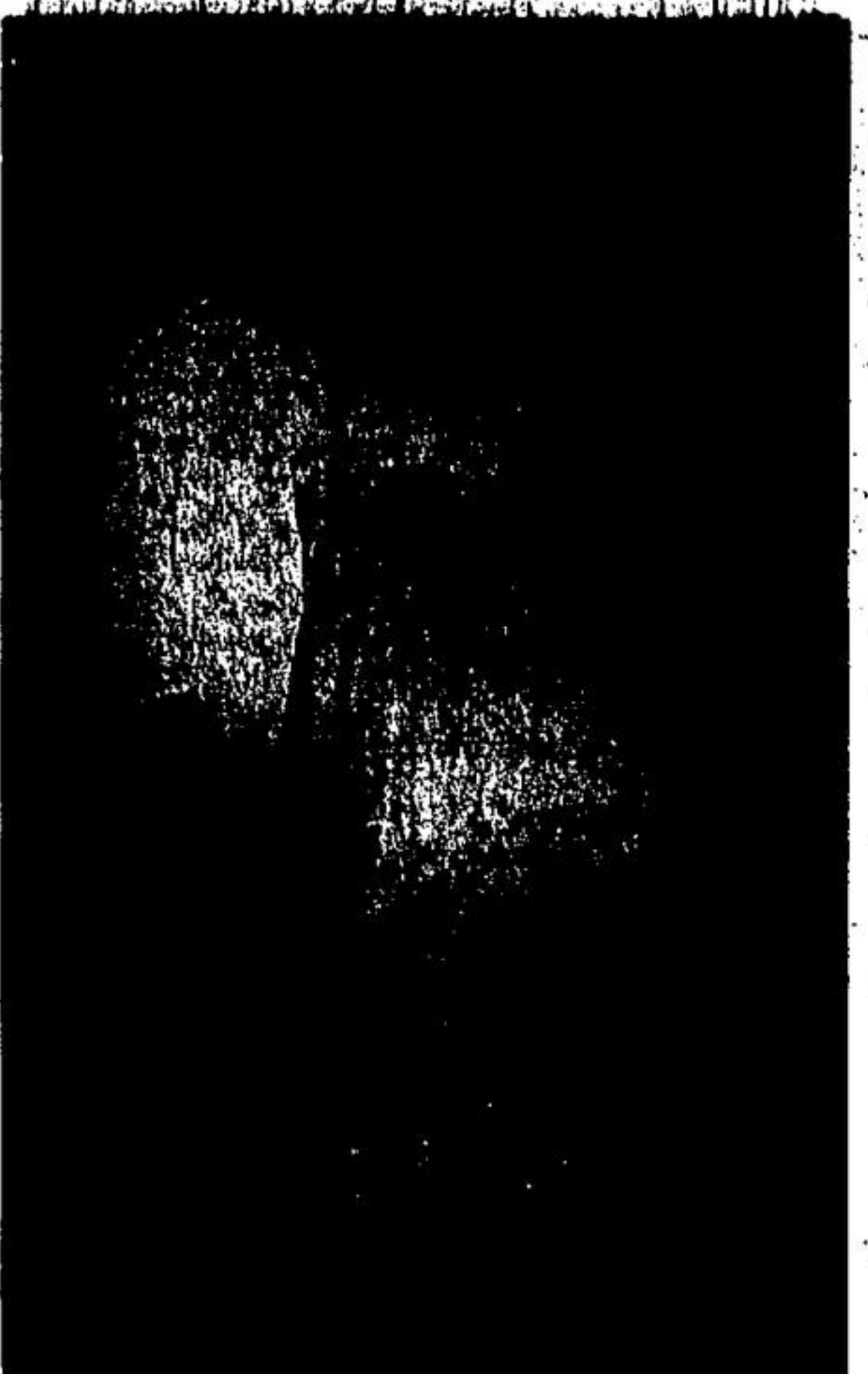
Mel Jordan portside hurler for the losers had trouble locating the plate and his last one was nicked every time as the hotel boys drove a few long ones.

Town Living Preferred By New Minister, Wife

With pleasure at being back in a small town, enthusiasm for the new church, appreciation for the newly-decorated home and growing friendship for members of the congregation, the Rev. and Mrs. Dwight I. Engel are getting to know Acton.

The new minister of the United church, Mr. Engel conducted his first services last Sunday morning in the Y.M.C.A.

The couple have three children: ten-year-old Judy, four and a half-month-old Milton and a baby on the way.

Mr. Engel was born in Kitchener and attended public and high school there, going on to Waterloo College for his B.A. degree. After three years in Toronto he received his diploma in theology from Emmanuel College.

Capreol First Charge

He was ordained in First United church, Hamilton, in 1954. For four years he was minister of Trinity United church in Capreol and from there went to St. Luke's United church in Sudbury for two years.

An interesting sidelight is the fact that he was interim minister of St. Paul's United church in Sudbury which extended the call to the Rev. Gordon Adams, who preceded Mr. Engel here.

He was the home mission convener of the Sudbury Presbytery, which is one of the largest at 360 miles in length, and travelled widely there.

Church "Impressive"

Mr. Engel was pleased to note that plans for the new church here reveal it will be much like the new church built at Capreol while he was there. He explained it was very beautiful and impressive and members of other congregations contemplating new buildings came from miles around to see it.

Mrs. Engel also comes from Kitchener, went to public and high schools there and then Waterloo College. She and Mr. Engel were married in 1952, when he was still at college.

"We are very pleased with the house," the couple agreed enthusiastically. They saw it last March and can really appreciate the amount of planning and hard work done in the meantime. "We intend to have an open house in the fall," they said.

The turn-of-the-century house, graciously designed, has been redecorated and repaired, and new furniture added.

Active in Groups

Mr. Engel was on the school board and Y board in Capreol. The Railway Y there caters to railwaymen away from home for long periods of time, and provides living accommodation as well as recreation.

He was also a member of the Chamber of Commerce there. A favorite sport is badminton.

The family will only be in the manse until the middle of July and then go on holidays for a month. They have a farm on the French River.

Mr. Engel was especially pleased with the choir here.

Repair Bridge

Deteriorating from spring thaws the school creek bridge is being repaired this week by town workers.

Approved by council last week the work on the bridge will provide for retaining walls on the eastward side of the bridge to prevent its further washouts.
