The Georgetown Club will host the Acton Club to a steak dinner since they only accumulated a 97 per cent record while the Acton members racked up the 100 per cent.

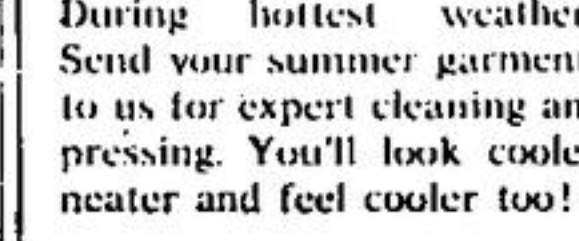
The impending early August visit of the District Governor was announced and secretary Gord Lewis reviewed extracts from the District Governor's letter.

Antique Car Cavalcade Draws Stares Tuesday

Once-familiar sounds of a bygone era echoed through the streets of 24 southern Ontario communities, including Acton, when such proud automobiles as Gray-Dart, McLaughlin-Buick, Rockne and Willys Knight made the fourth annual London to Brighton Tour of antique and classic cars. The tour lasted from July 11 to 13 and the cavalcade drew stares here Tuesday morning.

The tour is conducted by the Antique and Classic Car Club of Canada and sponsored by British American Oil. It commemorates the original London to Brighton tour in England, driven annually since 1904, celebrating the repeal of the "Flag Law," which required that a runner, carrying a red flag by day and a red lantern by night, precede each horseless carriage to warn pedestrians.

Start at London
Two dozen cars, ranging in age from 1911 Model T Ford to a 1937 Buick, gathered in London on Sunday, July 10, to receive final instructions and to add last-minute touches of "elbow grease" to the already gleaming entries.

Monday morning the entourage cranked up and set out on the first leg of the 300-mile trip which took the cars through Stratford and Kitchener to Guelph for an overnight stop. Tuesday the group passed through Acton, Brampton, the northern outskirts of Toronto and on to Peterborough for the second night's rest. The final day saw the tour enter Brighton en masse for a parade and official ceremonies at the finish line. It then proceeded to Port Hope for the wind-up parade and banquet.
