A July bride, Miss Catherine Elliott, was the guest of honor at several showers before her marriage to Bill McHugh in Nassagaweya Presbyterian Church.

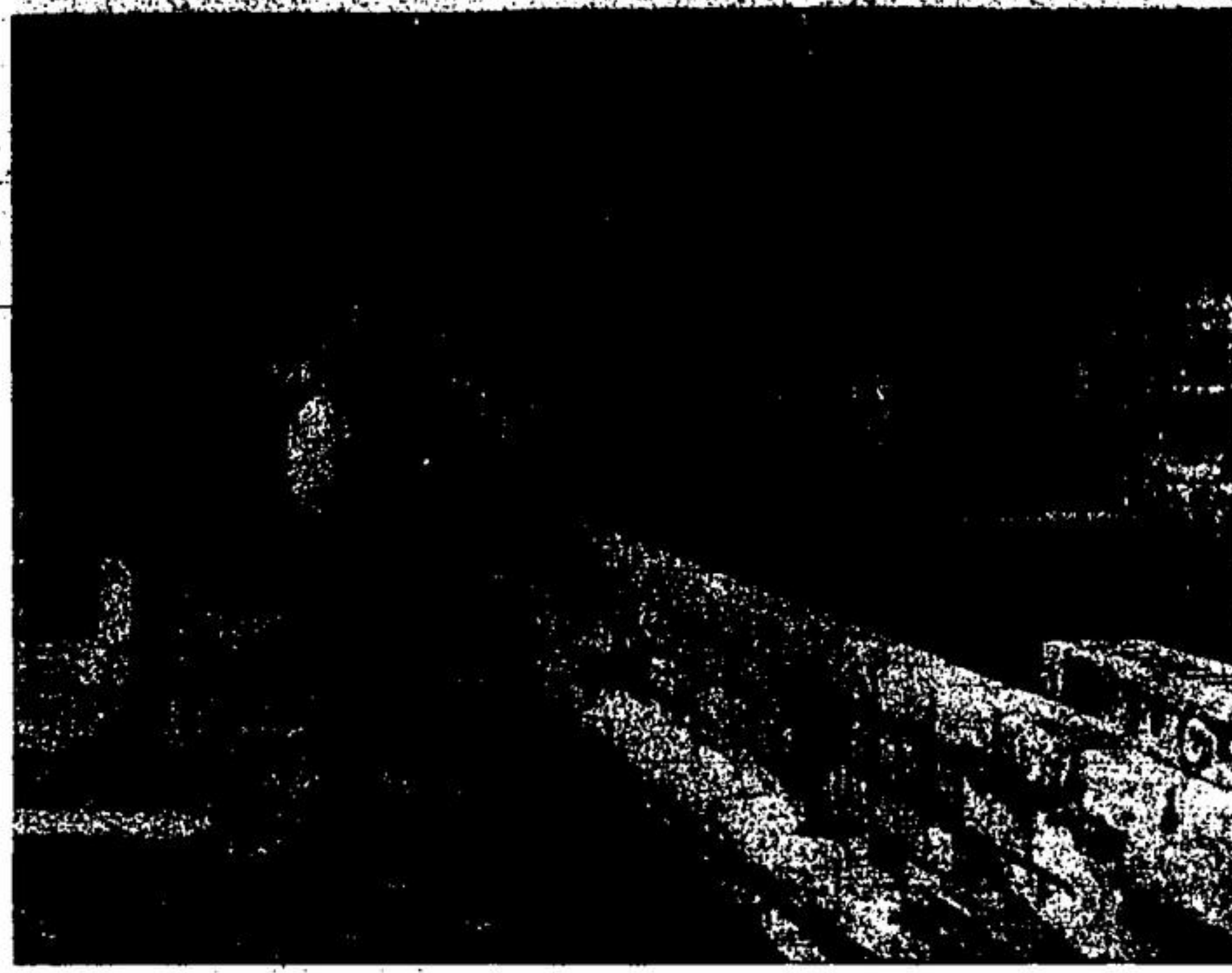

## Compulsory Training Procedure Required for Hunting Licence

Everyone 15 years of age or over who has never obtained a hunting licence must comply with the following requirements:

The applicant must register with his nearest Safety Training Instructor whose name can be obtained from any licence issuer.

The instructors will collect a \$2.00 registration fee.

When sufficient applications are received to hold a training class the applicants will be notified by mail. The classes will be held as close to the applicant's residence as possible.

### Better Safety

The purpose of these classes is to promote better hunter safety and will include lectures on safety and the handling of firearms. On graduation a competence card will be issued which must be shown when he obtains a licence to hunt.

In order to avoid disappointment at the last minute, applicants are urged to get their registrations in as early as possible.
