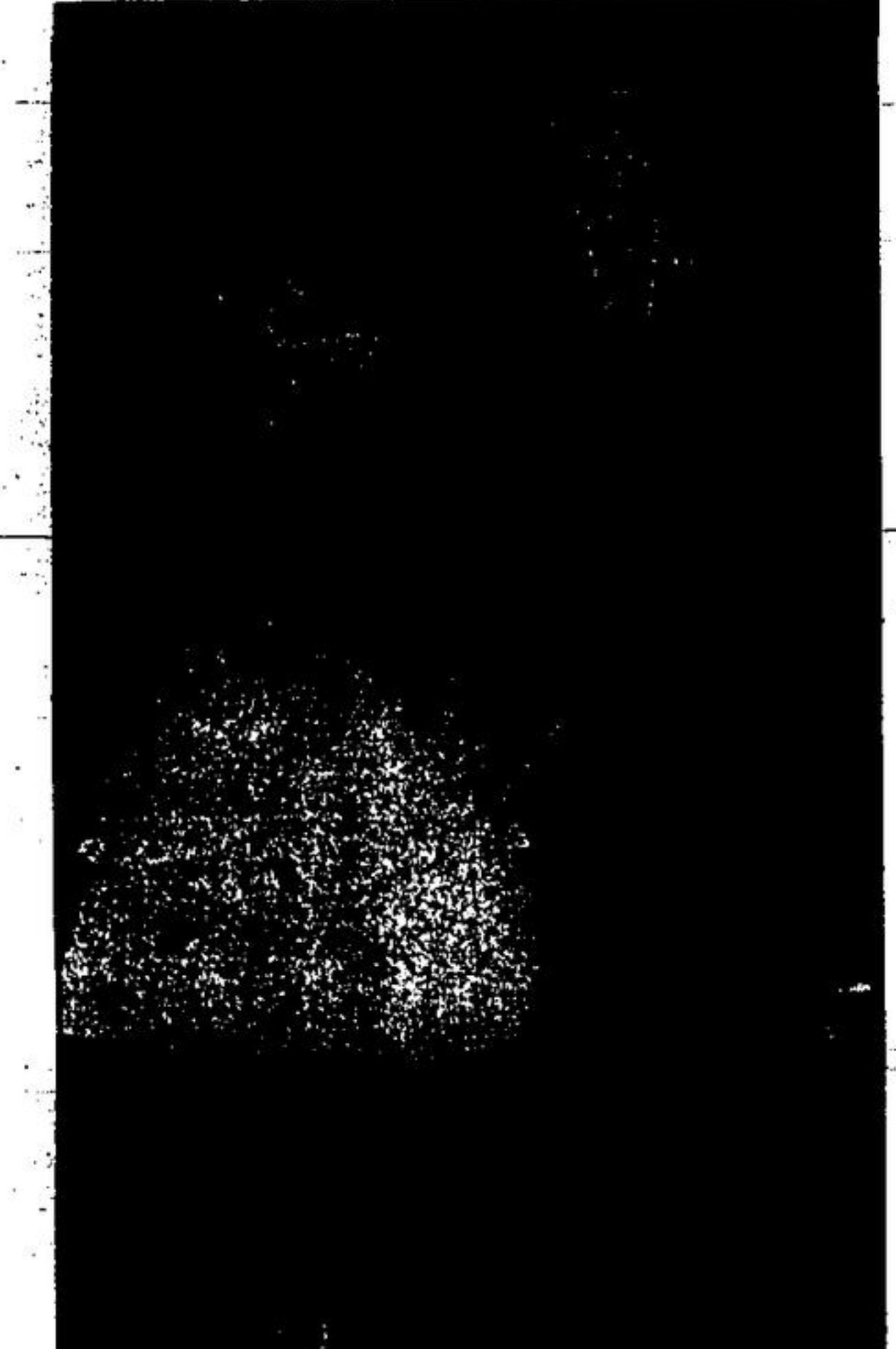

FOR A SAFER HARVEST — Do You . . .

1. Plan ahead to avoid confusion and hurry? Have grain bins and machinery in good repair and ready for use?	() ()		
2. See that shields and guards are in place over power shafts and drive mechanisms of such machines as combines and grain elevators?	() ()		
3. Always shut off the power before lubricating, adjusting or clearing combines OR ANY OTHER MACHINE?	() ()		
4. Walk around the combine to be certain that everyone is clear before starting it?	() ()		
5. Carry a fire extinguisher and first aid kit on tractors, trucks, and combines? Know how to use them?	() ()
