# Opened Branch in Acton in 1910 Bank of N.S. Marks Anniversary

The year 1960 marks the 50th anniversary of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Acton. True, it was the Metropolitan Bank which opened a branch here on July 28, 1910, but this bank was amalgamated with the B.N.S. in 1914.

Since that time, the branch has had only four managers—A. L. Wyant from 1915 to 1917; W. K. Graham, who must have seemed to many older Acton people a true "home townsman" since he held the position for 30 years, until his retirement in 1947 (he still resides in Acton); A. W. Haydon, December, 1947 to April, 1952; and the present manager, W. A. Woodburn.

Loan Program In 1958, the Scotia Plan, a new installment personal loan program, was introduced. The following year, the B.N.S. became the first Canadian bank to announce a "revolving credit" plan, known as Scotia Plan Cheque Credit.

Staff Increases Ten years ago, there were four staff members, of whom one, Mrs. Anne Deveau (nee Dunn) is still in the service.

During the same period, the bank introduced a transferable gold certificate, to facilitate the purchase of, and trade in, gold, and this was extended so that gold may now be purchased for delivery and storage in Toronto, London, Frankfurt (Main) and Johannesburg, or for delivery to any country where entry and possession is permissible.

Many Improvements In the past few years, the branch has been altered to take care of increasing business and new lighting, air conditioning and a night depository unit have been installed.

Same Objectives "Wherever Rotary clubs are located," president Andrew McKenzie asserted, in discussing the governor's visit, "their activities are similar to those of the Rot-

ary club of Acton because they are based on the same general objectives—developing better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men, promoting community betterment undertakings, raising the standards of business and professions, and fostering the advancement of understanding, good will and peace among all the peoples of the world."
