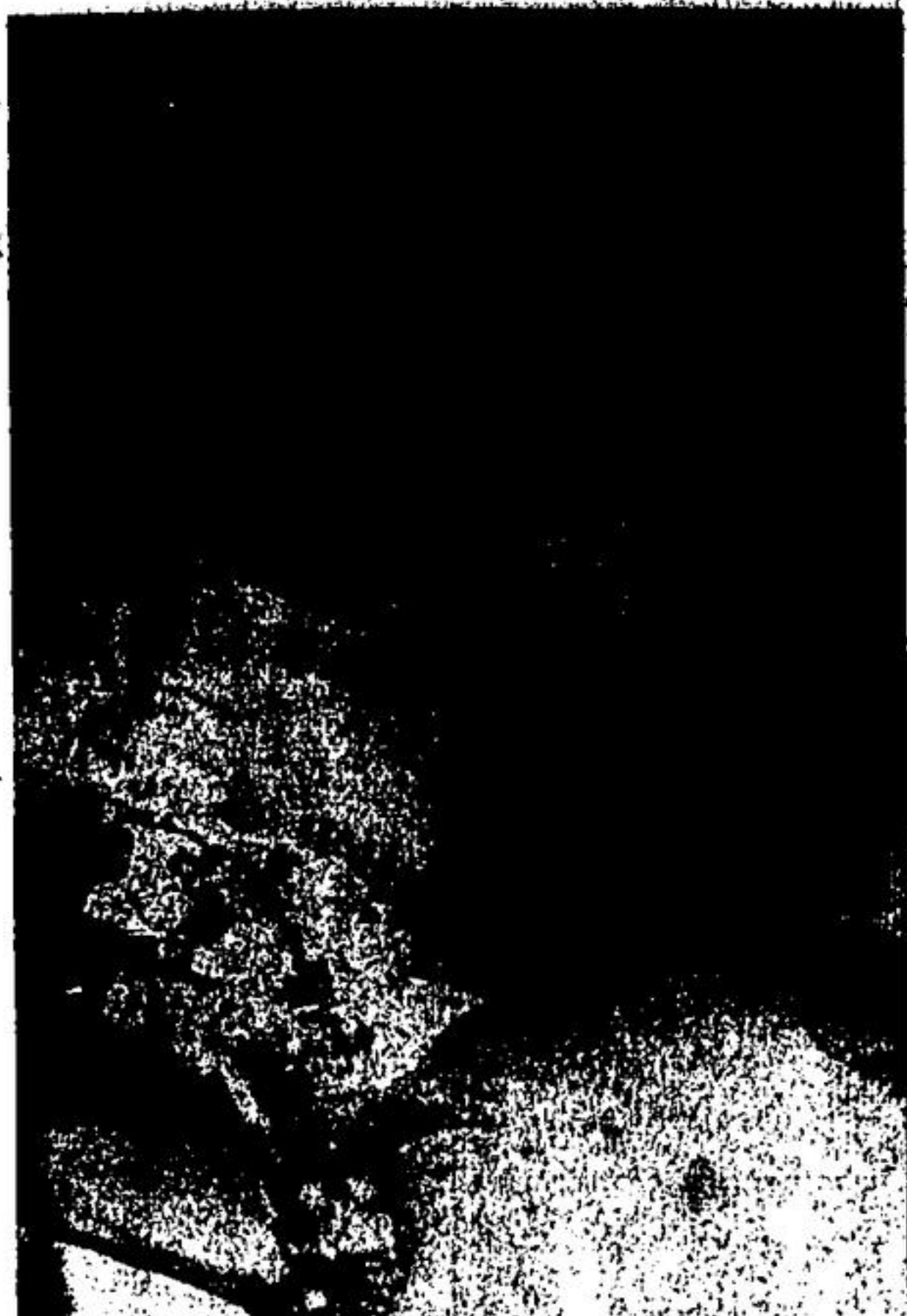

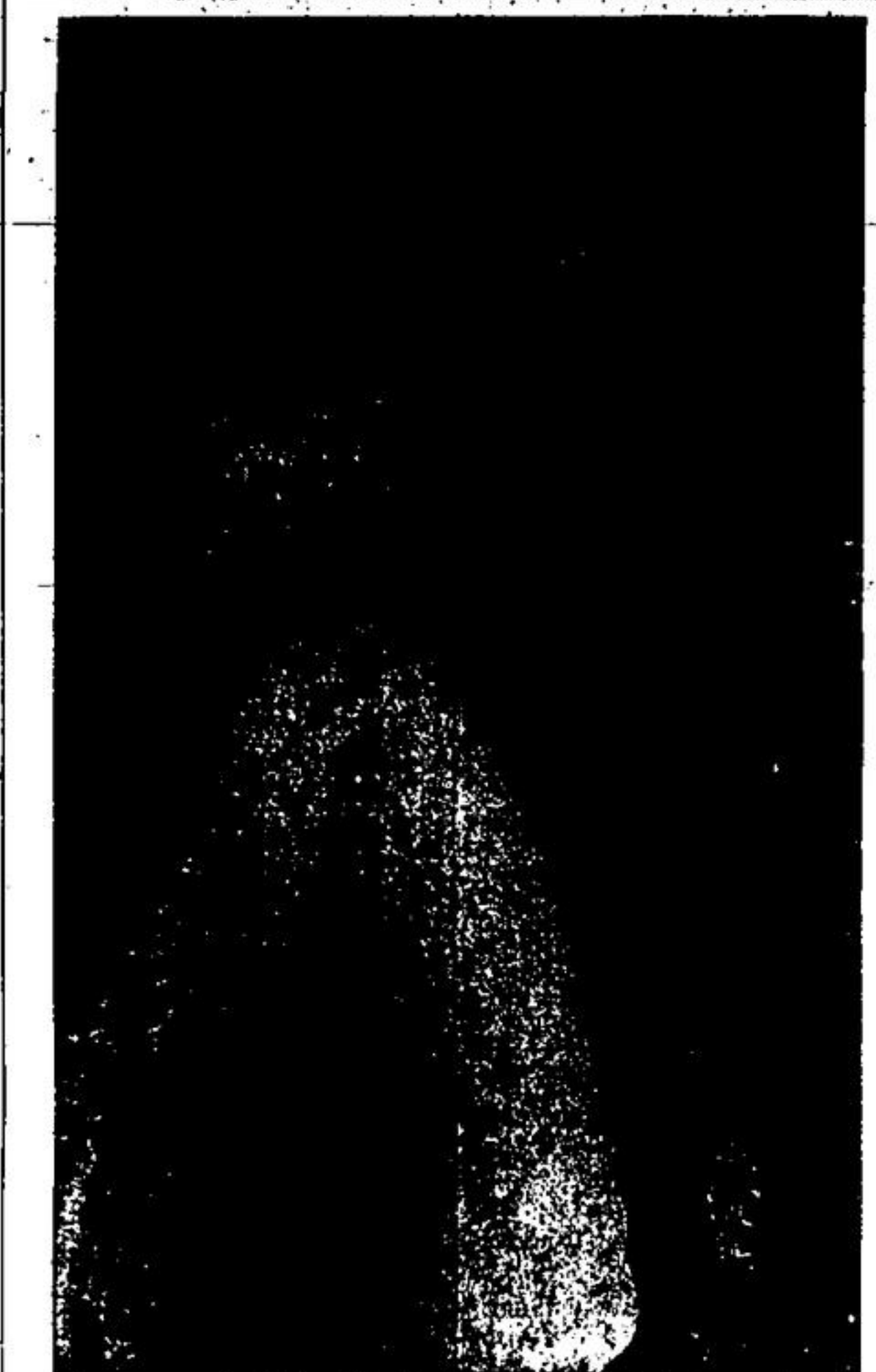

Refuse Acton School Request For Three Levy Payments Yearly

A suggestion from the Acton District High School Board that Esquimaux township pay the school levy in three yearly payments, was not well received at council's regular meeting Monday. The board suggested the payments be received in March, June and September, but councillors noted they would have to borrow the money, as taxes were not due that soon. Councillor Willard Bird suggested taxes could be collected twice yearly, but the clerk noted this would mean additional bookkeeping. **Pollute Creek** Correspondence from the Ontario Water Resources Commission explained that a township sand and gravel pit was discharging excessive solids into the creek, and asked that dikes be repaired to prevent over pollution. Ratepayers Joe Wright and M. Harg complained to council that their fences on the Fifth Line south of Limehouse were broken when the road was repaired recently. Council agreed to have a new fence erected. Another complaint was received from Bill Cook, Tenth Line, who said dirty red water was flowing into his clean pond, and claimed the dirty water was caused by new ditches. The council and Department of Highways engineers are to check the matter. **Pay for Food** Two representatives of the Georgetown Hunters' and Anglers' Association persuaded council into paying half a \$54 feed bill for 450 pheasants, which are penned in the township and will be freed later. More information was asked on a county proposal that a \$24,000 deficit in the new Milton District High School financing be added to the township's county levy next year. Permission was given the Credit Valley Conservation Authority to erect five directional signs to the Terra Cotta Conservation Area.

Joyce Gervais Opens Hairdressing Salon

A new hairdressing salon opens in town on Friday. Its operator is Mrs. Joyce Gervais, the former Joyce Papillon, who commences business at her home, 32 Cameron St. She has just completed her course at Kitchener Waterloo hairdressing school, Kitchener.

Haltom, Peel Trust Offer 30,000 Shares

Shareholders of Haltom and Peel Trust and Savings Company are being given the first opportunity to purchase 30,000 treasury shares at \$12.00 a share. Offer expires Sept. 14. After this date, any unsold shares may be offered to the public. **Near a Million** Authorized capital of the company is \$2 million and paid up capital \$699,440. Sale of the additional shares will bring the paid-up capital to approximately \$1,000,000. President A. S. Nicholson and Vice-President and General Manager O. E. Manning point out that the sale of additional treasury stock was made necessary by the growth of the company, particularly in the last two years.
