Former Area Resident Henry Hosking Buried

A man well known in the Guelph-Rockwood area for many years, Henry S. Hosking died suddenly at the home of his son, Benjamin H. Hosking on Friday. He was in his 88th year.

Born in Devonshire England in 1872, he moved to Canada while still a young man. He resided in Rockwood intermittently from 1912 to the time of his death. Mr. Hosking was millwright with the International Paper Company until 1929, and worked in Grand Mere, Quebec, Bellows Falls, Vermont and at Grand Falls Newfoundland. After his retirement he farmed for a number of years.

Mr. Hosking was a member of the Rockwood United Church and was active in the session there. He was also interested in gardening. He married the former Elizabeth Thomas in Grand Mere, Quebec.

She predeceased him in 1953.

Survivors include: two sons, William of Bathurst, New Brunswick, and Benjamin of R.R. 1, Guelph; one daughter, Mrs. Minnie Gordon of Sarasota Florida; 15 grandchildren. Two sons, Dr. Frederick J. and Henry and a daughter, Mrs. Sibel Stokoe, predeceased him.

Funeral service took place at the Rumley-Shoemaker Funeral Home, on Tuesday.
