Smelt Increasing Threaten Game Fish

Sudbury—Pollution of inland lakes in this area by an increasing smelt population may seriously threaten existing game fish species if the present rate of reproduction continues, according to officials of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests here.

Each year, tons of smelts are taken by fishermen from district streams.

Unfortunately, the smelt also is found in some inland lakes where they were placed years ago by careless or unthinking persons who did not realize the harm they were causing, officials say. Today, these same lakes are polluted with an increasing smelt population.

Charles A. McNabb, R.R. 4, Rockwood took first place with a 12 acre field of Rodney oats with an approximate yield per acre of 80 bushels. This field scored 94 points.

Second place went to Clayton Davis, R.R. 3, Rockwood on a 10 acre field of Rodney with an estimated yield of 75 bushels per acre. This field scored 93 points.

Ted Brown, R.R. 1, Limehouse who entered the competition for the first time took third place with a 15 acre field of Garry oats with an approximate yield of 80 bushel per acre, and a score of 93 points.

Other winners in order of planning with variety and score received are: Calvin Aiken, Garry, 92 points; S. E. Griffin and Son, Garry, 91 points; Harry G. Murray-Rudney, 90 points; Charles Thompson—Rodney, 89 points; Gordon Leslie—Garry, 88 points; Duncan McPhedran—Rodney, 87 points and Alex McPhedran—Rodney, 87 points.
