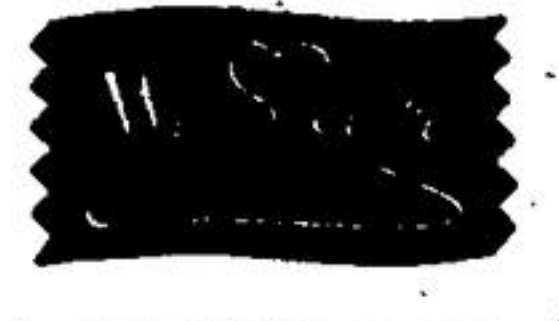

Halton's dairy princess Mary Lou Taylor will contend against 41 other county princesses throughout Ontario this week, in the final part of their quest in the title of Ontario Dairy Princess.

During the spring and summer, girls from around the province aspiring to the coveted award have taken part in county preliminary competitions for the right to enter the fifth year of the Ontario event at the C.N.E. Miss Taylor, 18, of Burlington became Halton's princess for the second consecutive year when she was crowned May 20 in Oakville, during the Halton Holstein Breeders' meeting.

Crown on September 7  
Each night five girls compete towards the semi-finals which will be held on Tuesday, September 6. The final competition to decide the Dairy Princess of Ontario, 1960, will take place on Agricultural Day, Wednesday, September 7th.

The young ladies must be between 16 and 29 years of age, married or single and have lived on a farm. The winner will be selected by the judges on the basis of appearance, deportment, cleaning and sanitizing utensils, efficiency, and completeness of milking and time.

Competitions will be held in the main ring of the Coliseum between the hours of 6 and 7 p.m.  
Later Semi-Finals  
The winner for each day of the preliminaries will compete in one of the semi-final competitions to be held at the same place and time on September 5th and 6th.

The winner and runner-up of each semi-final contest, plus the highest scoring contestant of the preliminaries, will compete in the final.

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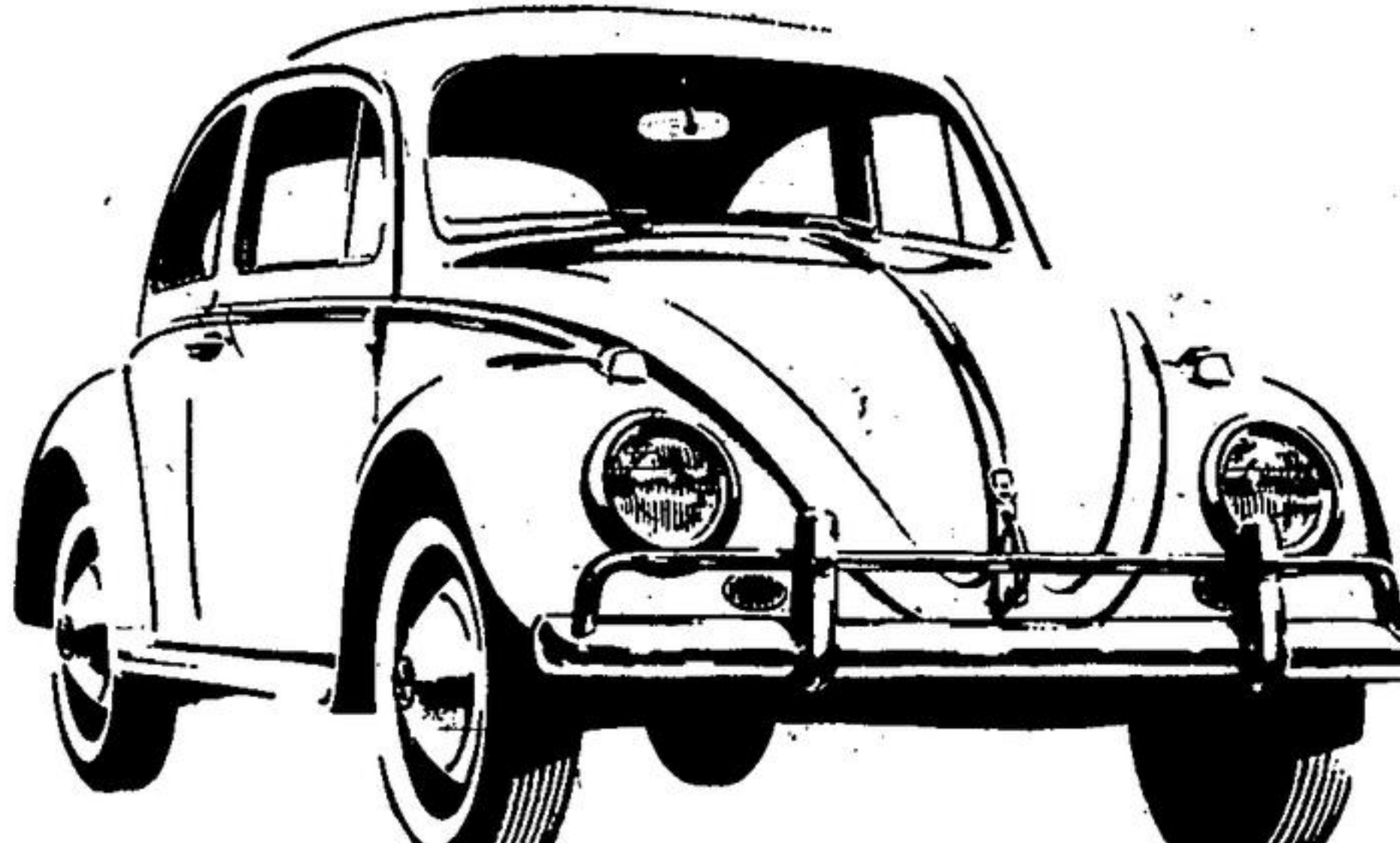
