

# Dominions Shellack Peasants Win Semi-Finals 14-0 Tuesday

Favored Dominion players won the right to meet the Legion team in the Acton softball finals Tuesday night when they shellacked their upstart rivals Station Hotel Peasants 14-0 before a record crowd at the park.

Dominions took a 4-0 lead in the early stages of the game and never looked back once as their ace pitcher Ed Phillips stymied the opposition with his bag of tricks.

Phillips racked up six strikeouts, allowed two walks and two hits, during the seven inning game.

**Use Three Pitchers**  
Peasants utilized three pitchers with Bruce Cargill starting moundman relieved by Ed Owens who gave up in favor of Dude Lindsay in the darkening moments of the game.

Cargill was touched for nine hits during his stay including two

doubles, Owens gave up eight hits including three homers, two doubles and a walk while Lindsay pitched to two batters giving up a walk.
