

### Dundas Takes Two Straight Defeats Acton 11-5 Saturday

Dundas tightened their grip on the Halton County Senior "B" title Saturday afternoon when they defeated Acton Merchants in Acton to the tune of 11-5 to put them two games up in a best of seven series.

Lack of hitting and a tendency to boot the ball around were costly for the home towners and manager "Dude" Lindsay was unable to whip his charges into top performance for the game.

Dore went the entire route for the Merchants, giving up 13 hits including a homer, triple and double and three walks. His team mates committed four costly errors, which hastened their downfall.

#### Start Ball Rolling

Dundas started the ball rolling in the early stages of the game when after two batters were put out, Lake hit a safety and romped home when Thompson touched Dore for a homer to score two runs. McPhail singled but was left stranded on base when Ribson filed out to centre.

Acton went down in short order in the bottom half of the first when Anderson struck out, Bruce singled but was caught going to second, and Barrager swung at three fast ones.

Dore and his team mates settled down after the rough first inning and kept Dundas off the score sheet for the next three innings as they displayed some expert ball playing.

#### Acton Ties Score

Acton evened up the score in their half of the second when Townsley tripled, coming home when Paul Lawson slammed a homer deep into centre field, rolling past the softball diamond. The next three batters went down in order.

The Merchants took the lead in the bottom of the fourth when Tracy Barrager singled and Paul Lawson slammed

another four-bagger high over the trees and fence. The side was retired with Acton having a two-run margin with the score 4-2.

Dundas licked their wounds and bounced back in the top of the fifth with a four-run rally after the first batter, Rowe, went down swinging. Martin reached first on an error chalked up to second sacker Townsley, trotted to second on a hit by Lake to right field and continued on to third when the fielder, Anderson, bobbled the ball. Thomson walked to load the bases. McPhail corked a long single, scoring Martin and Lake to even the score. Thompson and McPhail crossed home plate on a hit by Ribson before the side was retired.

#### Dundas Clinch Lead

Dundas clinched their lead in the top of the sixth when they racked up three more runs as Rowe reached first on an error by the right fielder, trotted to second on Martin's single and both runners scored on Lake's triple. Lake scored when Thomson was forced out at first on a grounder. McPhail grounded out and Shields went down via the swing out route.

Acton, held scoreless in the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth innings, managed one run in the last half of the nine when MacGregor walked and breezed home when Don Lindsay clobbered a triple.

Dundas got their last tallies in the top of the seventh when Ribson and May scored.

### Dundas Takes First Game 9-4 In Senior "B" Playoff Series

Dundas took a one-game lead in the Halton County Senior "B" finals Thursday in the valley town, defeating Acton Merchants 9-4. The second game of a best of seven series, it turned into a comedy of errors for Acton.

Although they out-hit Dundas 10-9, the Merchants committed five costly errors, two of them occurring in the bottom of the fourth when the home team scored five of their runs.

Close Contest? The contest was close up until that point. It was tied four-all as the teams opened the fourth with John Cunningham, the second Acton hurler, toeing the slab. Jim Lindsay started. Cunningham was nicked for a single by the lead-off batter, he gave up a triple, walked two batters and allowed two more singles for five runs before he was retired in favor of Jeff Fryer, who finished the game.

Lumas, the Dundas left-hander, a former pitcher with Hamilton Cardinals, gave up 10 hits and struck out six as he went the distance for the homesters. Acton collected four singles off him in the third frame for three runs, their best inning of the game.

Both clubs scored a pair in the first frame. Bob Bruce singled, followed by back-to-back safeties from the bats of Harold Townsley and Tracy Barrager. Rowe, Dundas' lead-off batter, opened by wangling a walk. He was sacrificed in by Thomson after making it to third on a follow-up base on balls and sacrifice by Lake.

#### Dundas Make It 4-1

Dundas made it 4-1 in the second frame after the Acton side went down in order by the strike-out route. Knox led the inning off with a triple, followed by a single and a double from Morden and Lumax respectively, and a single from Martin capped it.

Acton got back on even terms in the third when Bruce, Townsley, Barrager and MacGregor all singled for three runs but that was the end of the Acton scoring.

The clean-up end of the Acton

line-up came through with hits. Townsley and Barrager each had a perfect night at the plate with three hits in as many trips. Knox paced the scammers with a triple and a single.
