Agriculture, Commerce Share Arena Space During Fall Fair

Plans are nearing completion for Acton Fair, Friday and Saturday, September 16 and 17. No effort is being spared to make this year's fair an outstanding success.

This week the arena will begin to take on a new look as R. L. Davidson and A. Robinson, superintendents of the hall, and the members of the various committees prepare for the arrival of the many exhibits for the agricultural show and commercial displays.

Working at the north end of the arena will be Norman Braida, Ted Tyler Sr. and other members of the Chamber of Commerce measuring and marking spaces for the industrial displays which will be coming in next week.

Members of the Acton-Nassagaweya 4-H Club will be putting the finishing touches on their calves next week, preparing them for their Achievement Day. Many hours of work, feeding and caring for their calf and attending meetings, will have been well spent as the member with the highest aggregate score for the year is awarded the A. J. Murray and Son trophy. In addition, each member receives a cash prize.

Prizes for All Special attractions during the afternoon will be a potato race and musical chairs where contestants must be 14 years or under and ride on ponies, 12 hands, two inches or under. Each contestant will receive a prize.

A wild west atmosphere will come to the fair when a pony race takes place. There will be two classes, one for the 122 and under ponies and one for 122 to 142 hands. Each class must race a half mile. If the rider is able to stay aboard and keep his pony on course, he will be awarded a prize.
