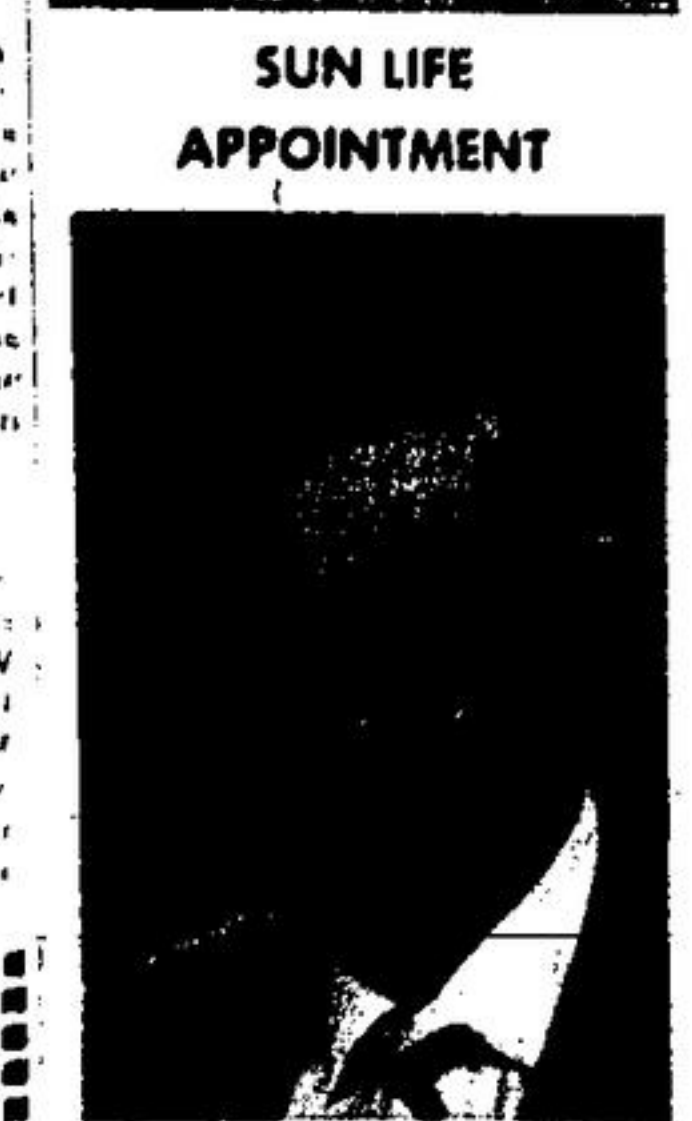

Seek Approval for Extension To Present Watermain System

"We have to think of our school children. Why protect them at the foot of the school lane (a crossing guard exists there) and have them killed at this corner? It's stupid," exclaimed Mr. Bradley.

He told council the board didn't intend to let the matter drop and if they didn't get anywhere, would keep hammering away. "Good," exclaimed Reeve Greer. "We'll keep hammering away with you. We can't do any more than we have done or any faster. We've tried for 10 years." The delegation and council decided to act on the suggestion of Reeve Greer to have the safety branch and department of transport meet with both parties regarding a survey at the corner.

Second Delegation
A second delegation representing the Parish of St. Alban's church was present to request council's consideration toward improving the sidewalk from Bower Ave. to the parish hall on Willow St.

Harold Denny, spokesman for the group, pointed out the problems caused by broken sidewalk in this area. He noted that on one occasion a person had received a broken leg when they tripped on the broken pavement. He also told how a pallbearer almost fell carrying a casket when leaving the church.

It was also pointed out that tree trimming was necessary in the church area and two old trees required removal.

Trees No Problem
"The tree problem is not hard to get around but the sidewalk is another question," stated the mayor.

Councillor H. Lowe suggested the street and road committee review the situation. Clerk-administrator J. McGeachie informed the delegation he and the road committee chairman had viewed the area and had received all permits for sidewalk repair.

When W. McLeod told the council their sidewalk was by far the worst section in the town, indicated prices had increased for this area. He suggested further sidewalk repair be undertaken by council's committee and that Ri-

Hydro to Receive Award For Accident-Free Year

Acton Hydro employees were praised during the regular hydro commission meeting, Thursday, September 8 when it was learned the Hydro crew had earned a certificate of merit for an accident-free year during 1959.

A letter from the Electric Utilities Safety Association informed the commission their department had earned the certificate for their excellent safety record. It was requested to have a member of the work department attend a meeting in Toronto to receive the award.

Chairman E. G. Jakes Sr. extended congratulations to hydro superintendent D. Mason on behalf of the commission. He suggested members of the commission accompany the workers to Toronto when they receive the certificate.

No Opening
Superintendent Mason noted sufficient time had elapsed for one of the workers to be raised to a class "B" linesman from his present status. He was told the hydro department did not have an opening for another class "B" linesman as they had enough top men presently.

It was suggested, however, if the worker desired to remain in his present capacity, it was quite all right and if not, a letter of recommendation would be given him to seek employment elsewhere.

Asked by commission G. McCutcheon if he needed another "B" linesman, Mr. Mason stated his department was almost caught up with rush work but he requested commissioners of the extra work entailed during the winter months.

Mr. Mason reported on the progress being made at the south spring line where lines are being rebuilt.

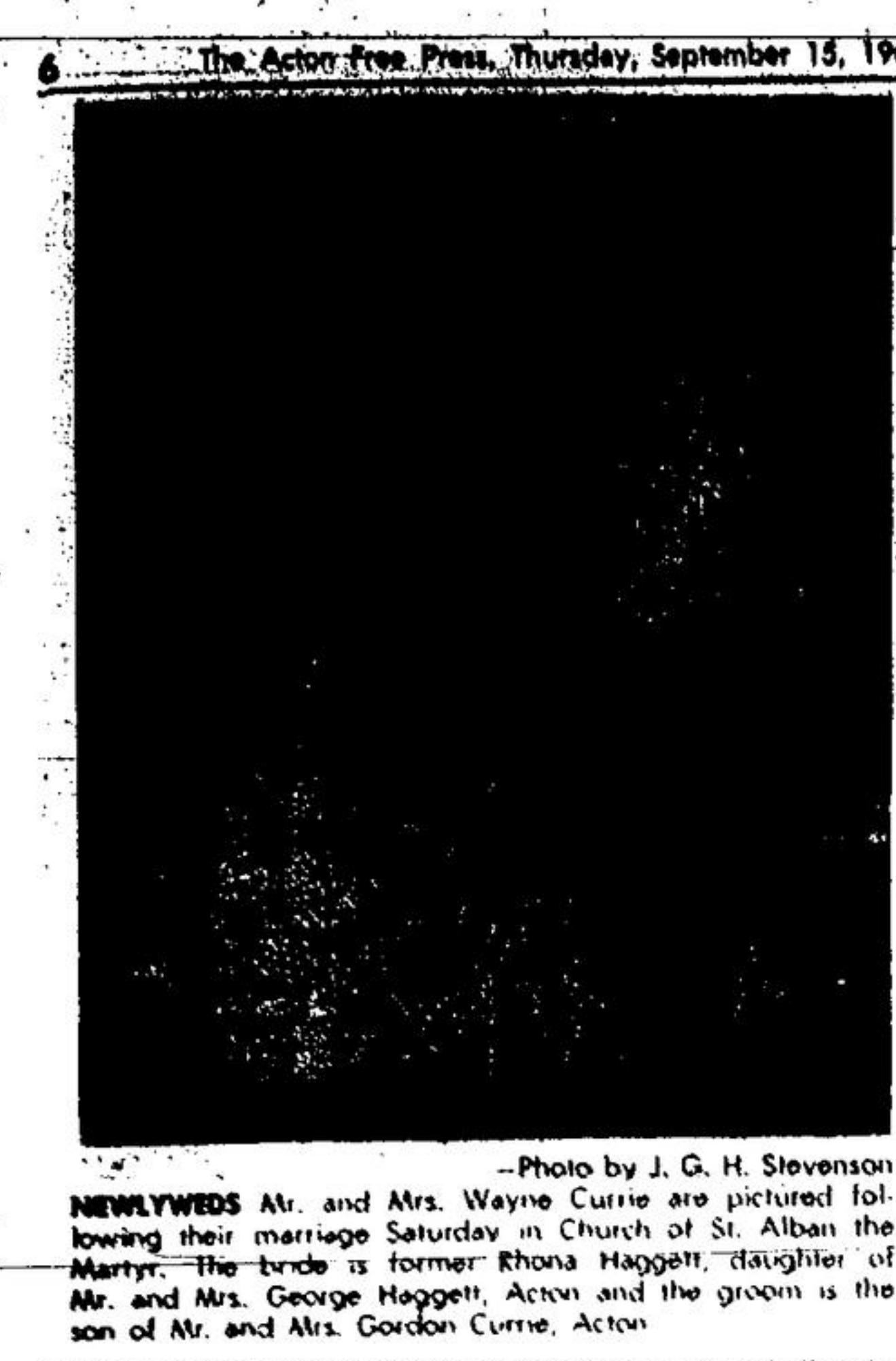
