Miss Mildred Allan, sister of the bride, was flower girl. She wore a pink nylon dress with blue and white accessories and

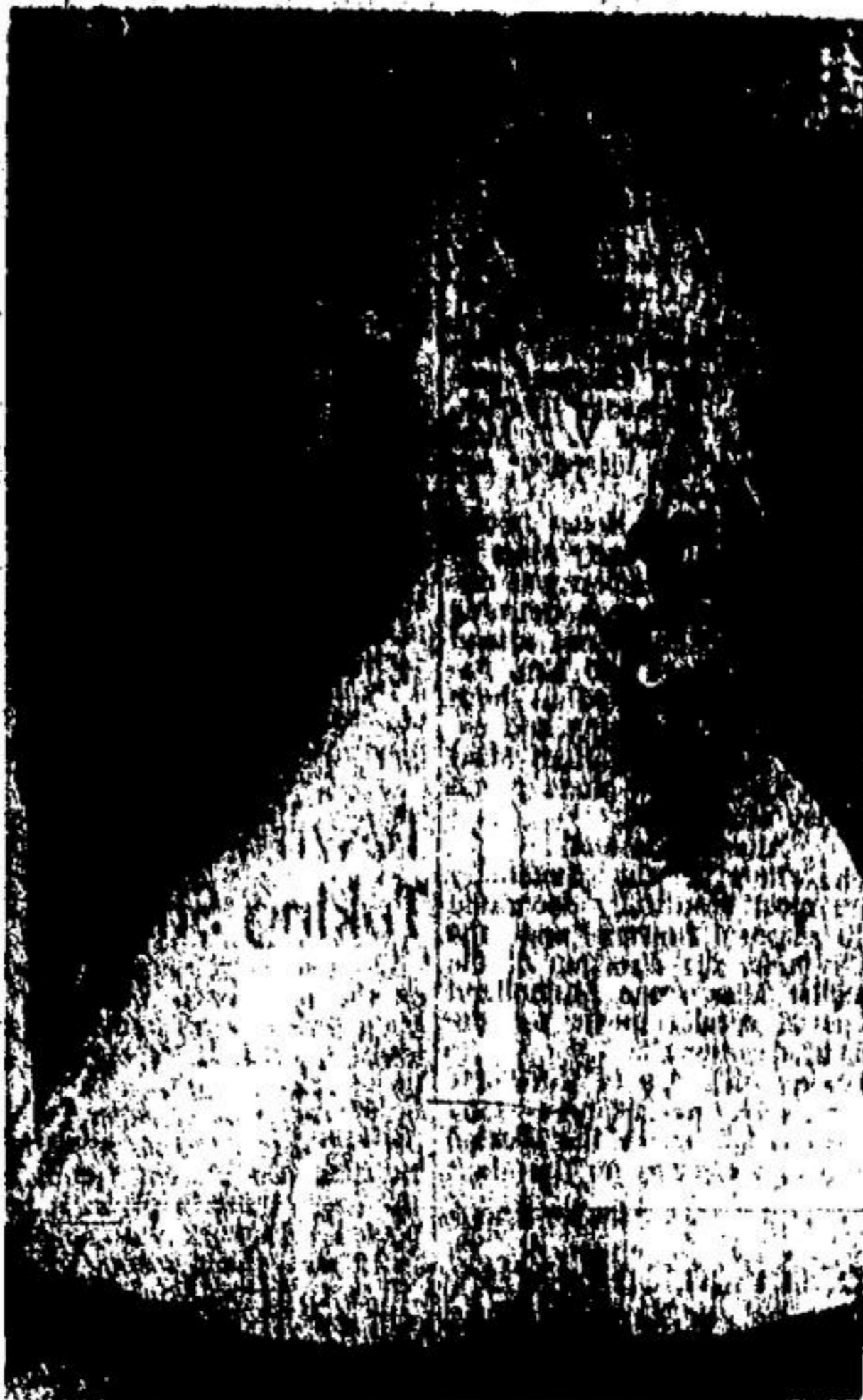
