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the planning board had not been turned over to his committee for processing. He was informed they had not been viewed as formal applications.

On a suggestion by Mayor J. Guy and Mr. Hardman, an official vote was taken on whether the zoning by-law should be amended lifting restrictions on building garages.

Everyone present with the exception of Mr. Whitham gave the nod of approval to a change and R. H. Elliott informed the meeting he would not vote.

Before the meeting concluded, everyone present voiced an opinion on the garage question but no concrete action was taken.

J. Harley, representing Dairy Queen Company of Canada Ltd., was present to request the planning board's consideration in rezoning property owned by J. J. Stewart on Queen Street east next to Grant's Motors. He informed the board the property was zoned residential and he was hoping it could be rezoned from residential to commercial.

Mr. Harley notified the board his client would comply with all building regulations. He noted the proposed building would take up approximately 800 square feet and provide a parking area.

It was also pointed out the business would not be of a drive-in type but require customers to park and walk to the building for service.

Mr. Whitham suggested the board should review the application and instruct Mr. Harley in their decision.

Ask Rezoning

Planning Board received a letter from J. Van Der Brink, C. Rogivalds and G. W. McKenzie requesting rezoning of their properties on Main Street north to residential from industrial.

Mr. McKenzie also requested permission to build additions to his home.

The secretary was instructed to write the three ratepayers in order to acquaint them with the reasons for zoning their area industrial and notify them the board did not favor rezoning this area.

Hayrack Clips Car In Speyside Crash

A hayrack pulled by a Massey-Harris tractor damaged the 1954 Pontiac of Ivan McLeod of R.R. 1, Acton on No. 15 Sideroad about a half mile west of Speyside, Saturday morning.

It was agreed to donate the siren and spotlight from the town ambulance to the St. John Ambulance Brigade and arrangements were completed for the Brigade to use a room in the Town Hall for meetings. Storage of their ambulance in the town workshop building on Main St. south for the winter months was also approved.

Questions Procedure

During the enquiries by members, councillor A. Field informed council several residents had complained to him about the school board and teachers selling insurance to the pupils.

He asked "How come this is done in the schools?" and suggested it was just a racket with some broker sitting back gathering in the money while the teachers did the work.

He pointed out he did not oppose the insurance but was opposed to having the teachers act as agents for the insurance company.

"It is no business of the school to sell insurance," he stressed.

Reeve J. Greer agreed the teachers should be teaching instead of selling insurance. Councillor G. V. Barbeau suggested not much time would be lost by the teachers but agreed some work was involved.

Mr. Field was informed perhaps the school board could shed some light on the subject and if not then it would be up to council to investigate further.

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Hydro Increases Deposit Rates For Domestic, Commercial Users

Effective October 15, consumer deposit rates at Acton Hydro office will be increased for domestic and commercial users. Domestic users will be assessed an additional \$5 and commercial users \$10.

This action was approved by the commission during their regular meeting Thursday, October 22, after it was pointed out the present deposit charges are not sufficient to offset costs of turning power on and off.

Present domestic consumers are paying a \$10 fee and commercial users are paying a \$25 fee. It was pointed out that existing contracts are not affected by the increase and until a new contract is required, the old contract price would be honored.

The commission also agreed to adopt consumer deposit forms recommended by the Ontario Hydro for future use.
