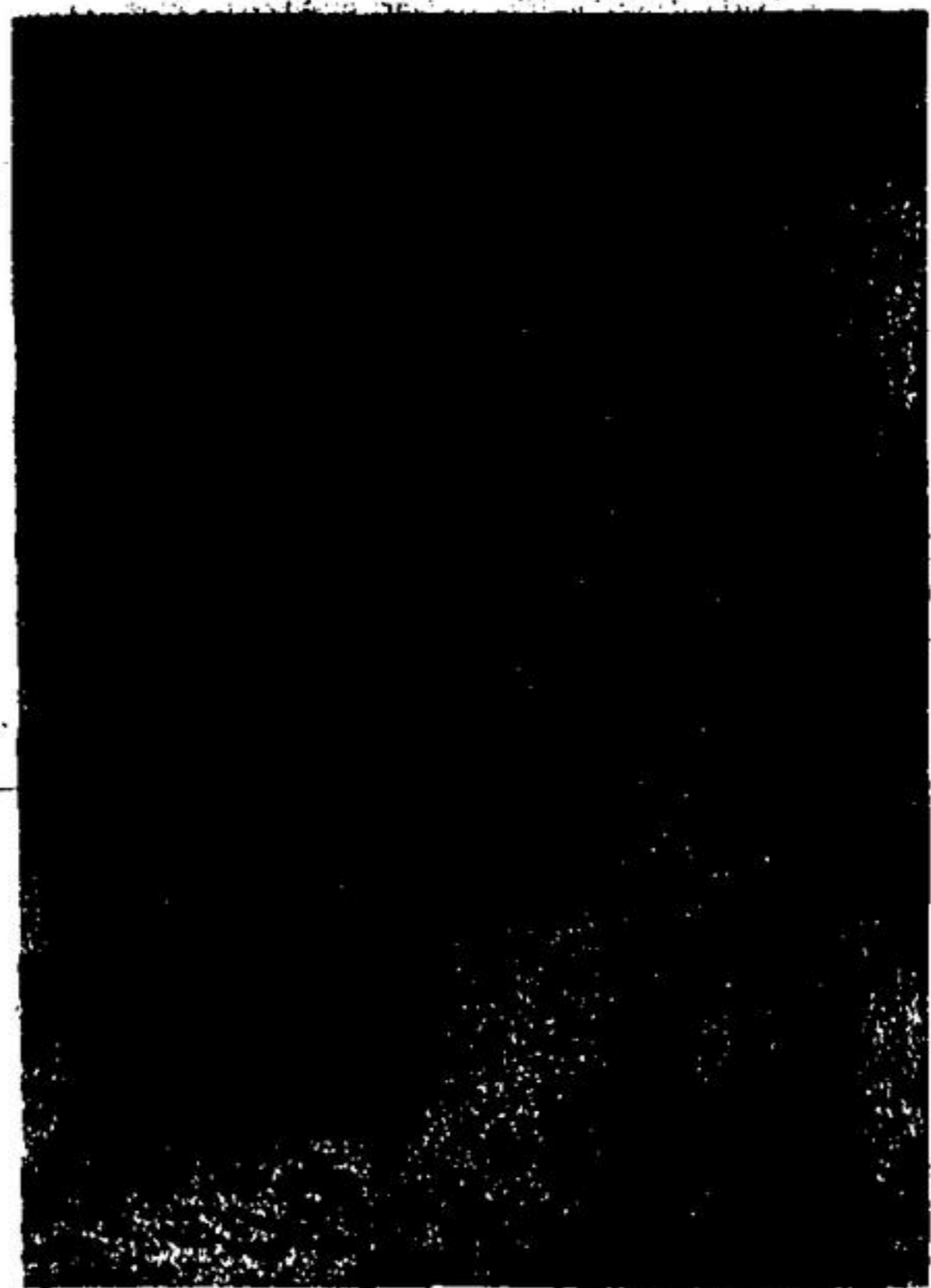

The object of calling the meeting was not an appeal to the organizations for money, but for support and help in getting over to the people of Acton just what "Hallowe'en for UNICEF" really means. Five years ago the collection was around \$12.00, last year \$128.50.
