Mr. Deacon stated the logical use for the property would be C-2 but pointed out that offstreet parking would be required as the operation would be classed in the restaurant category.

J. Witham, board chairman, had heard the Young - Queen Street corner nicknamed "Suicide Corner" and claimed if this business was allowed the board was adding an additional hazard by allowing traffic to move into this area. "Planning means to plan for safety as well," he emphasized.

Mr. Goy said plans have been made for major changes at this corner and outlined the program to take place to relieve the congestion there. Mr. Deacon notified the board that neighbors living in the area would have to be considered and everyone should be notified within a certain area and a public meeting held to hear any objections.

H. H. Hinton, board member, suggested the ratepayers living in the area would not object to the Dairy Queen building as their homes had been built near a factory. He also suggested the proposed building would be an improvement to the area. It was agreed to hold a public hearing on Monday, November 7 and notify all residents within a 200 yard radius.

Arena Damage Lessens Chances for Amusement

In spite of attempts by Acton council to provide ice in the arena this year with a limited budget, vandals continue to cause setbacks by damaging arena property. Sunday night a sheet of siding was torn from the building, the back doors smashed open and lights turned on all night.

Periodically this year the arena has been the site of vandalism and each time it reduces the town coffers to make repairs. Clerk-administrator J. McGeachie stressed this week that council is doing everything within financial reason to open the arena and provide ice for the youngsters but co-operation is lacking.

Mr. McGeachie urged the parents to stress the seriousness of damage at the arena, reducing the budget to the point where council finds it financially impossible to open the arena doors. "It would be too bad for the majority of youngsters to suffer an account of a few causing this damage," the clerk stated.
