Halton 4-H Clubs Complete Projects Under Assistance of Sponsors, Leaders

The Halton County 4-H Club Girls and Boys completed 179 4-H Club projects in 1960. The 4-H club program in Ontario is directed by the Extension Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the Canada Department of Agriculture and local sponsoring organizations. J. A. Francis, agricultural representative, and D. E. Jackson, assistant agricultural representative, direct the 4-H program in Halton county.

The Halton 4-H Club Leaders' Council, with chairman A. R. Coulter and vice-chairman John Willmott, are a group of over 30 4-H Club leaders who provide voluntary assistance throughout the year to the 4-H Club members in the county.

Receive Support Before a 4-H Club can be organized, there must be a local sponsoring organization. In Halton there is excellent support given in all areas of the county. The Acton, Georgetown and Halton Agricultural Societies, as well as the Rotary Club of Milton and the Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authority provide financial assistance and facilities for the 4-H Club members in their area.

There were 11 4-H Clubs organized in Halton with 38 4-H animals exhibited at fairs, and 45 field crop exhibits as well as 18 Forestry Club exhibits and a Tractor Club Achievement Day. Eight of the 11 4-H Clubs built club exhibits to demonstrate some part of their 4-H project at local fairs.

Many Projects In the Call Club projects, there were 41 Holstein, 11 Jerseys, 12 Guernseys, three beef heifers and 19 steers.

In the Swine Club, eight completed the project, with seven Yorkshire gilts and one Land-race.

There were two new 4-H Clubs formed this year in Halton, and both of these 4-H Clubs were very successful.

The Acton-Nassagaweya 4-H Club had 13 members complete their project. This is the first year these members have been in a 4-H Club and it is expected that interest shown by these members will increase this club in 1961.

The Halton 4-H Silage Corn Club, which was started to promote the growing of better silage corn, had 15 members complete the project. Excellent samples of silage corn were exhibited by all members at the Georgetown Fair.

Two 4-H Club members have been selected from each of the 4-H Clubs in Halton to represent their county in the Provincial 4-H Inter-Club Competitions being held at the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph on October 21.

This competition, sponsored by the Canada Department of Agriculture and the Ontario Department of Agriculture, gives 4-H Club members from across the province a chance to compete against each other.

The two members chosen from each 4-H Club compete separately in the competition and their scores are added together for the team standing. Competitions are held for members of 4-H Dairy Calf, Beef Calf, Swine, Poultry, Grain, Field Crop, Potato, Forestry and Tractor Clubs.

The final program for 4-H Club members in Halton is to be held on Friday, December 9, in the Milton High School. At this time all 4-H Club awards will be presented to the club members who have done such an excellent job this year.
