Avoid the expense and bother of a frozen radiator by having your service station dealer "fill 'er up" with antifreeze. Does your battery need charging? It's going to do extra work in cold weather.

Badly worn tires are doubly dangerous in ice and snow, so replace them now. And remember the spare, too.

When's the last time you had your car's electrical system checked? Better have it done now. And have the mechanic make sure your headlights are focused properly. You'll be doing a lot of driving in the dark as the days get shorter.

And, finally, it's a good idea to have the car thoroughly waxed to protect it from the snow and ice of winter.
