Reservoir Site
Final approval was given Tuesday for purchase of a parcel of land by the town from J. S. Ledger on Churchill Road North for a site for a proposed water reservoir. The land in question measures 300 x 150 feet and will be bought by the town for the sum of one dollar. According to the agreement Mr. Ledger will be supplied with a certain amount of water and have a hydrant installed near his property line.

Continue Ambulance
The welfare committee and the clerk-administrator were empowered to make necessary arrangements for continuation of existing ambulance service after October 30. The present service is being operated by Frank Toth and according to the agreement, the contract now in existence expires the end of this month.

Monday evening during the committee of a whole meeting, chairman Les Dubsy of the welfare committee reported a meeting with two Guelph men desiring to establish an ambulance service in Guelph. Mr. Dubsy reported the men intended to purchase two new ambulances and one old one and if successful in receiving a subsidy from the city of Guelph, they would be able to start in the ambulance business. It was pointed out Monday evening the service could be applied to Acton.

No Proclamation
A request from two members of the local UNICEF committee for council to proclaim Halloween for UNICEF in the town Monday, October 30, was turned down unanimously.

Councillor Barbeau enquired if council was to approve the request would they be representing more than 50 per cent of the people and heard mayor Goy reply, "You've got me. The reception I have received certainly doesn't indicate it."

Councillor Lowe asked if the schools were organizing campaigns and was told by the clerk he understood they were as the letter indicated the Halloween for UNICEF plan had been approved by the minister of education and Acton schools had given their consent to the plan.

"Don't get me wrong. I think the principle of the thing is good but holding it on Halloween is depriving the children of the most wonderful night of the year with the exception of Christmas," stated councillor Barbeau. He agreed the idea was excellent and would teach children to think of others and he would favor it any other night but Halloween.

Mr. Lowe pointed out that several parents drove their children around in cars on Halloween night to collect pennies for UNICEF and suggested the parents do the calling at doors. Mayor Goy stated he couldn't endorse the methods adopted and pointed out the Halloween timing was poor.

The mayor told his colleagues it seemed to be an international move passed down to other committees until it reached the municipal level and now council was being asked to support the move. Mr. Barbeau remarked, "There is one thing that bugs me. Most children that go to school consider the teacher is law and if

the school says Halloween is for UNICEF, one child not wishing to participate, is not going to object. Therefore the parents are entitled."

Councillor Art Field remarked, "The school pushed the insurance deal and sale of Christmas cards and now this."

Council also:
● Approved the arena renovation program providing government subsidy is available.
● Approved payment of accounts for the industrial committee up to \$100.
● Authorized the clerk-treasurer to pay J. Bert Wood insurance agency \$4,886.53 for insurance premiums from July 15, 1960 to July 15, 1961.
