Record Class 46 Confirmed at St. Alban's By Bishop Wilkinson Sunday

The apostolic rite of confirmation filled the Church of St. Alban the Martyr to overflowing Sunday at 4 p.m. The public address system was put in use so those seated in the parish hall could participate. About 240 attended. There were 46 adults and children confirmed — a record number at one time here. The girls were dressed in white, the ladies in white blouses and dark skirts, and the boys and men in dark suits. White veils were provided by the Altar Guild.

The procession from the parish hall to the church included Barry Kirkness, the crucifer; the candidates, the choir, the rector, the Rev. H. B. Stokreef, the bishop's chaplain Laurence Doby and the

Right Reverend C. R. H. Wilkinson, M.A., D.D., assistant Bishop of the Diocese of Niagara. Mrs. F. Oakes played the organ for the impressive ceremony. The Bishop said collects at the chancel steps, and the rector presented the candidates to him "to receive the laying on of hands". The Bishop read the preface and two portions of Scripture, and gave the address. The senior and junior choirs sang an anthem.
