The track is owned by the City of Guelph, for which it is administered by the Guelph Junction Railway Co. Cancellation was approved by the G.J.R. and Guelph city council. The G.J.R. will receive \$5,500 annually for at least 27 years. Freight will continue to be carried on the line.

Hydro Commission Decides Not to Spend Funds For Annual Christmas Party

Acton hydro commission decided against participating in a municipal Christmas party this year, following a discussion Thursday evening, October 27, at their regular meeting. Mayor John Goy informed the commission, council was planning the annual party and asked if they wished to participate. He pointed out the expenses would be apportioned to each civic group participating and would come out of respective budgets.

Commissioner Frank Oakes replied he did not think the commission should participate this year but he told the mayor, "They have been lovely parties and I have enjoyed those I attended in the past." Commissioner Gordon Beatty asked clarification and was told by Mr. Oakes that a ruling had been made at an earlier meeting regarding spending municipal funds to entertain wives of commissioners. Mr. Oakes said he failed to see why the policy should be changed in this instance.

Party Expenses Mr. Beatty asked the mayor if the party expenses would be paid for out of municipal funds and was told by the mayor council had two alternatives—either to hold the party as they had in the past or not hold it at all. "They decided they wanted to hold it," he stated.

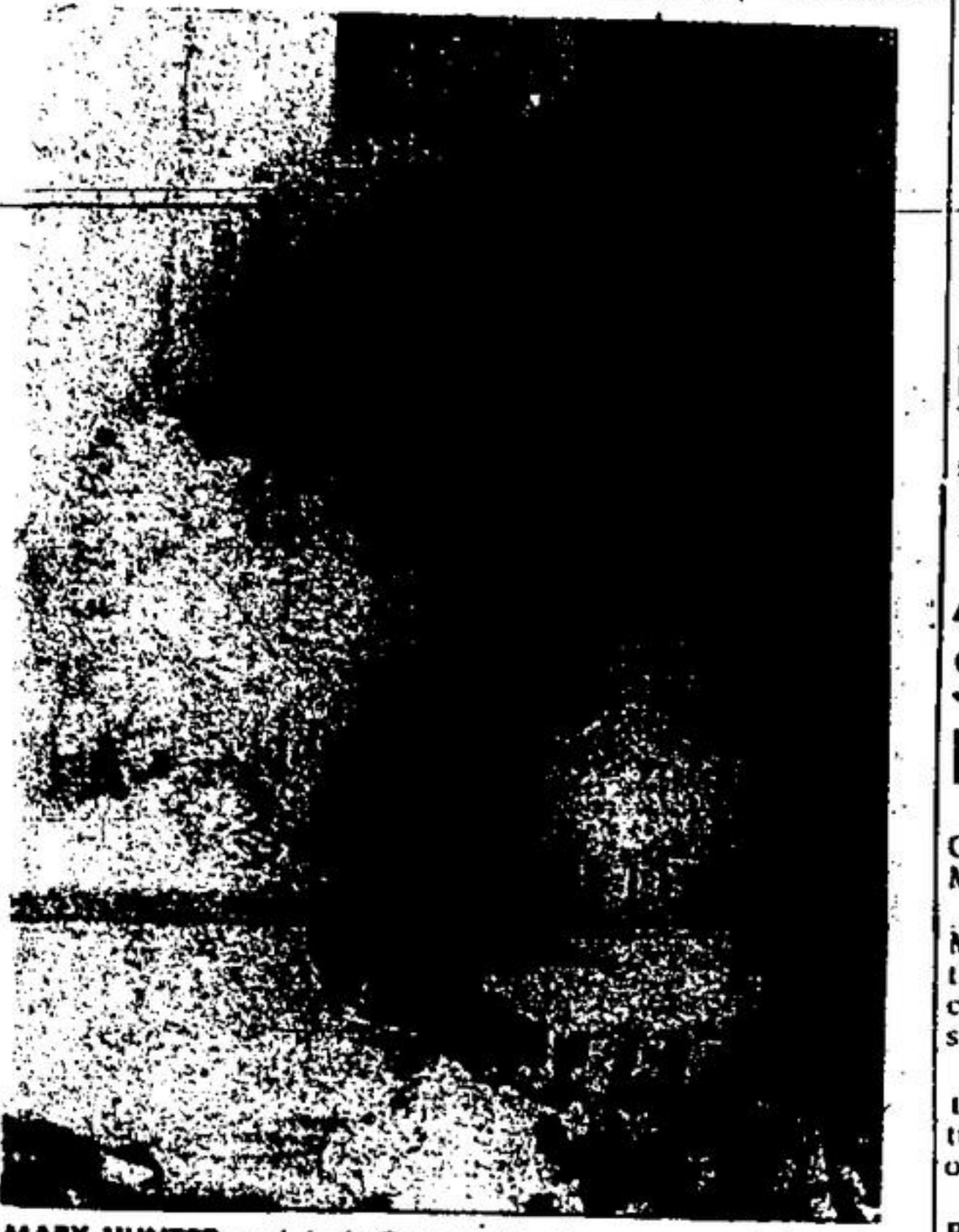
Head-On Crash Damages Cars
