PROCLAMATION Retarded Children's Week NOVEMBER 13th to 25th, 1960

WHEREAS it has been established that mentally retarded children can be helped through special schooling and recreational, social and workshop programs and that there is a great need for research into causes of mental retardation; AND WHEREAS public understanding will greatly contribute to easing the plight of some 3% of the population who are in some degree mentally retarded; NOW, THEREFORE, I, as Mayor of the Town of Acton, support the North Halton Association for Retarded Children in its effort to help our community's mentally retarded by declaring the period of November 13th to 25th, 1960 as "RETARDED CHILDREN'S WEEK IN ACTON"

Canadians Most Conservative People in World-Missionary

Mrs. P. Kitching was hostess for the W.A. meeting for November. Over 20 members answered the roll call. Mrs. John Henry led the devotions which included several passages of scripture and the hymn, "Praise ye the Lord for it is good."

A very interesting review of a chapter in the current study book "Africa Disturbed" was given by Mrs. George Robertson. A line of emphasis in her talk was "Responsibility accepted in the home on your own doorstep inspires responsibility in all life."

Mrs. Robertson said this could apply to any of us, regardless of the country in which we live. In Africa, they live in constant fear of spirits and they also have a lot of common law, probably because their laws are most rigid, although the missionaries are trying very hard to discourage common law.

Cults and Tribes Mrs. Robertson also described some of their cults and tribes, and how they present such a satisfying picture of unity among the people. Mrs. Kenneth Griffiths was asked for a few excerpts from Dr. McLure's address, which he gave in Chalmers church, Guelph, recently. Dr. McLure is a medical missionary in India. He said that in the East people used to be so changeless and now they are just the opposite. He also said \$5 would treat a leprosy case and \$10 would treat a tuberculosis patient for a year, and that Canadians are the most conservative people in the world, but they must live up to the responsibilities of the mission areas in south-east Asia.
