Develop Minds, Skills Speaker Urges Students

Nine serious-minded and attentive upper school graduates encircled by nearly 200 parents and fellow students heard a past moderator of the Presbyterian Church state that the finest qualities of mind and heart, the application of honest hard work and the love of God are the keystones to future success.

The Most Reverend F. G. Stewart, guest speaker, warned the students of the challenges in the future changing world and urged them to follow the proper path. Speaking before an audience of parents, teachers and students, Mr. Stewart combined wit and wisdom during his enlightening and masterful talk during the annual commencement exercises.

Beginning with amusing anecdotes, the speaker struck a more serious vein as he forecast serious and startling changes for the 1960 graduates.

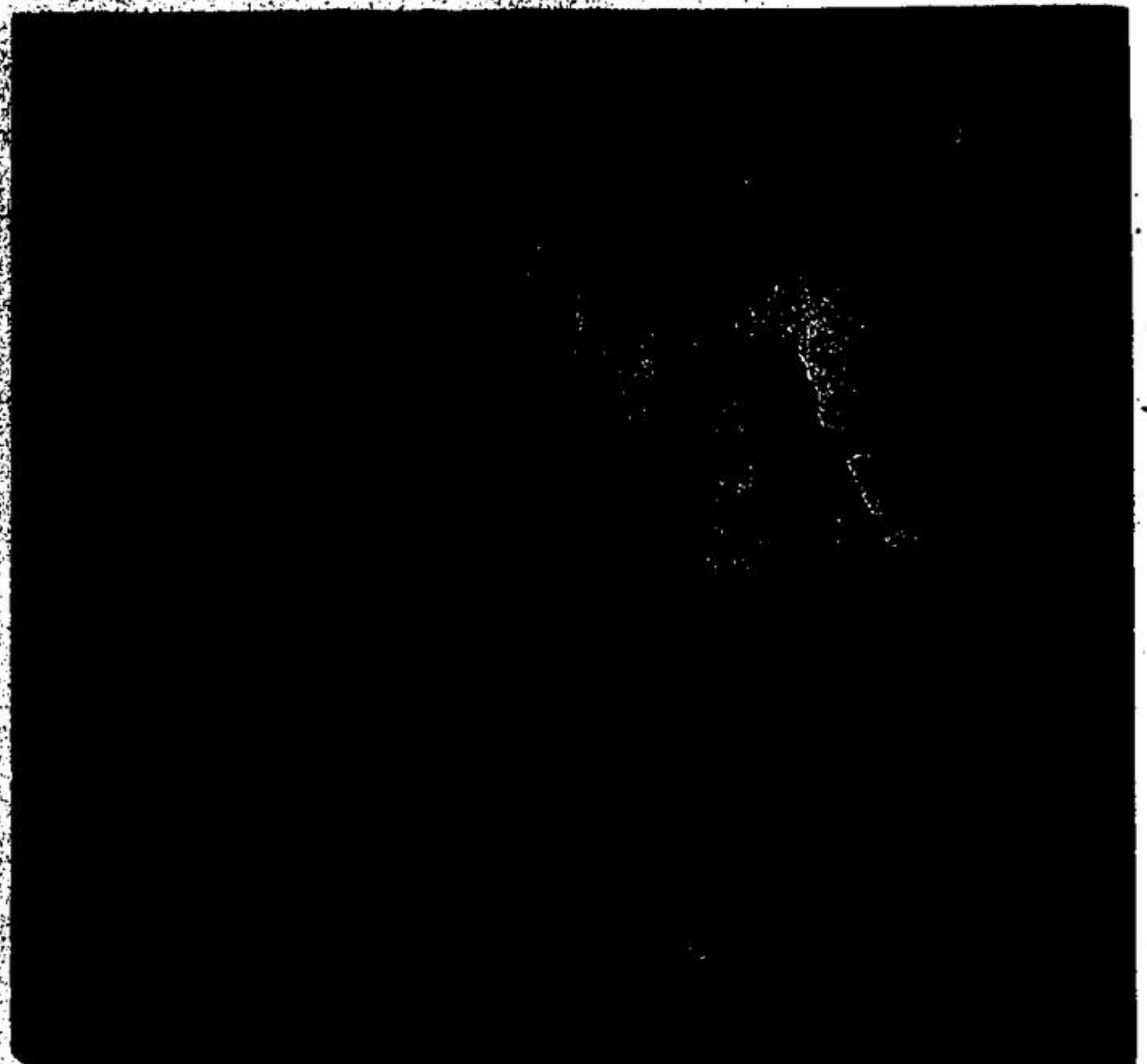

Students paired up with boy or girl friends and enjoyed a dance in the gymnasium to conclude the evening festivities.

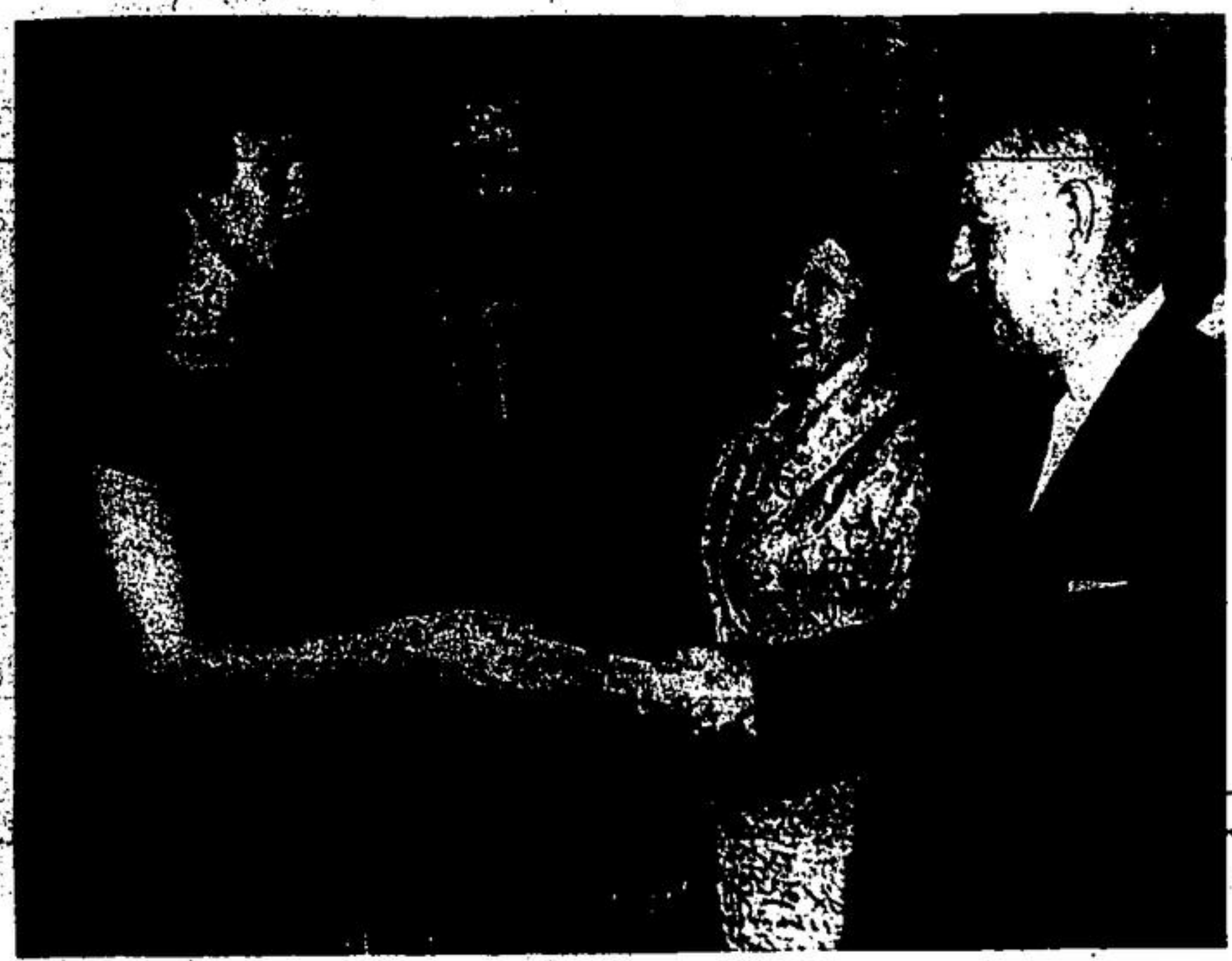
Daughters of Knox Meeting on Tuesday
