

Pounding the Sports Beat . . .



In last week's column we asked the whereabouts of the Rumley cup, a trophy much fought over in the era when it stood for "bush" leagues supremacy in Acton. We suspected it was covered in dust, buried in somebody's closet.

However, the phone jingled on Saturday and on the other end Frank Gibbons said something like this:

"I've got the Rumley cup at home. Had it there since Beardmore's won it back in the years after the war. I was captain of the team and the cup was presented to me. I've had it since."

Frank wanted to bundle the cup up and bring it over to the Free Press. But we persuaded him to keep it at home until another claimant could lay title to it. That's not likely unless an industrial league is formed within the next few weeks.

The mystery is solved. The cup is handy. All that is lacking is a league. Like having the team but not the home metabolite.

With Milton arena the local Acton Lions made an auspicious start for coach and manager, Ben Bayless and Ernie Marks respectively. Monday night their 3-1 win over Milton, a team with all the advantages of artificial ice and a fast start, could be indicative of a good season for them in juvenile ranks.

Most of the team stepped up as a unit from last year's midget club which topped the group championship being out by Heslop in the Ontario playoffs. Several players have been added as well. Pete Lawson and Lind say playing under Acton colors again after a year with Georgetown.

Acton Majors also entered in the Tri-County district as far as well as their first experience but their opponents have been playing together for several years which they are practically a new club under the tutelage of Emerson Baxter and Bill Buchanan.

Both clubs should furnish local fans with some good hockey once they open in Acton. Home games are being played in Milton until ice is available.

Ottawa Rough Riders and Toronto Argonauts will meet in the P.H.E. Eastern Provincial Conference (Big Four) final at Ottawa next Saturday for the first time in 25 seasons. The two-game home-and-home series will also mark the first time Argos have been in a Big Four final since 1955 when they lost to Montreal 5-3.

This year's playoff winds up at the C.N.E. stadium in Toronto. Ottawa's 30-14 win over Montreal in Ottawa on Saturday marked the second year in succession

that the Rough Riders eliminated the Alouettes. In 1959 Ottawa crushed the Alouettes 43-0.

Prior to 1947, Ottawa and Toronto battled seven times for the Big Four championship with Argos winning four playoffs and Ottawa three.

In 1951 Ottawa had the amazing experience of losing their four scheduled league games to Toronto but wound up winning the league title and, eventually, the Grey Cup.

A prediction on the outcome of the series? Like Marc Laffertiere, we hope, Ottawa wins but we're putting our nickels on Toronto. They may even win the Grey Cup.

The uncertain senior hockey picture in Ontario was dealt another blow this week when Oakville withdrew from the eastern senior division, leaving only one club, Galt, in the league. Belleville withdrew earlier leaving a two team league which just started an interlocking schedule with the western division.

Oaks have high hopes of entering the Central Ontario Intermediate league as an "A" entry. Their application is being reviewed tonight at a league meeting in Georgetown. The league consists of Georgetown, Milton, Barrie, Bradford, Dundas and Port Credit at present. Should Oakville be successful the circuit will again cover in Hamilton County.

Milton and Georgetown both are reputed to be entering teams of high calibre this year and the addition of Oakville would certainly strengthen the league.

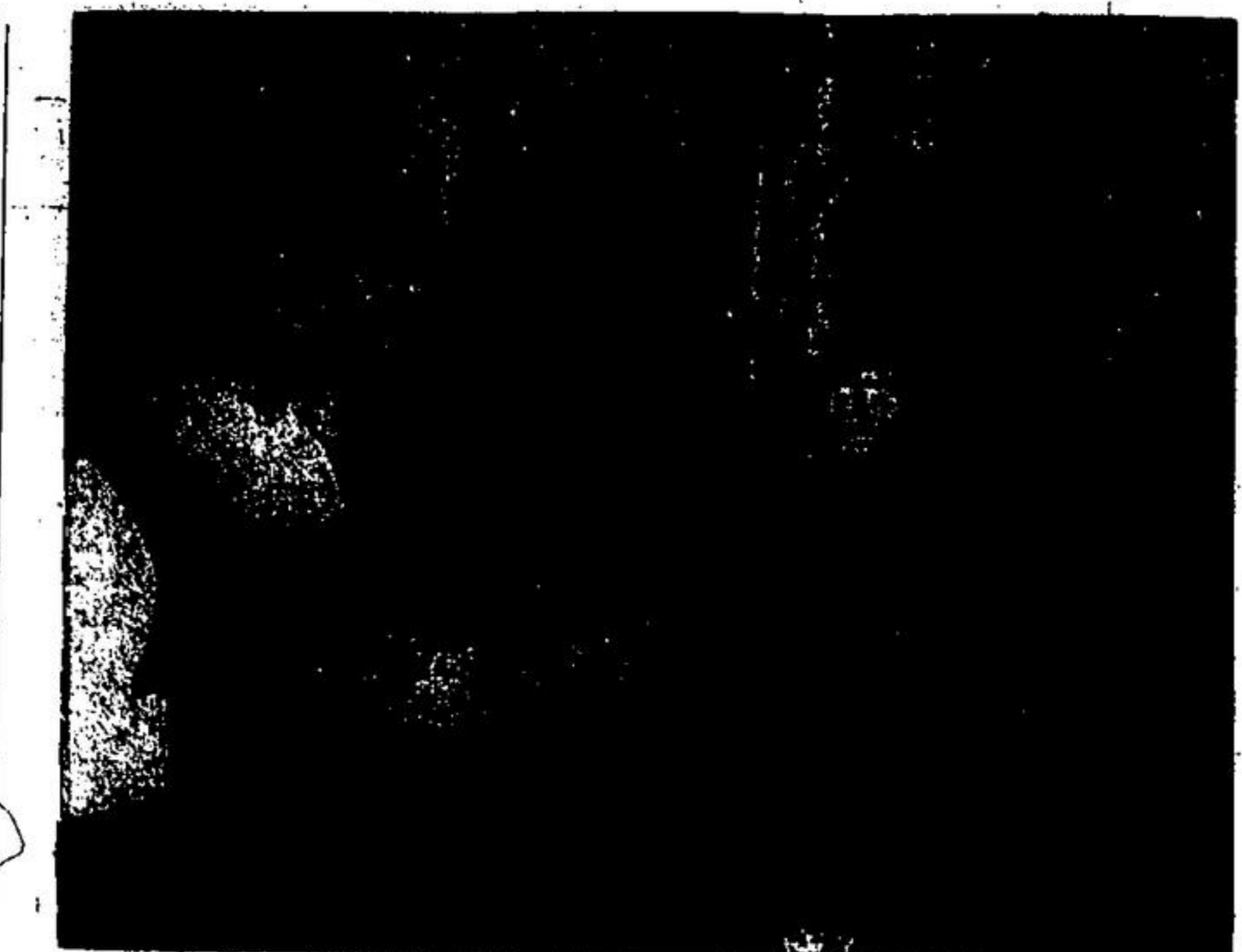
Midget Debut Marred by Loss To Milton Mon.
