Three Local Men Injured When Car Rolls in Ditch

Three young Acton men were treated for minor injuries when their car plunged off the road and into a ditch at Stewarttown early Saturday afternoon.

Driver Kenneth A. Dodds of 109 Mill St. received two stitches to his forehead and facial lacerations. Wayne Spires of 18 Main St. required nine stitches to close a gash in the right eye and also suffered facial lacerations; and Leonard Porte of 58 Lake Avenue received nine stitches to his jaw and two to the right eye plus facial lacerations. All were treated by Dr. A. E. McIntosh of nearby Georgetown.
