New Chapel Dedicated In Impressive Service

By Miss Martha Thompson Sunday, October 30, was a very impressive afternoon at the Manor, for on that day the new chapel was dedicated and used for the first time. Proceeding the dedication service, the regular church service was held in the auditorium. It was a service conducted jointly by several members of the Oakville-Bronte-Milton Camp of the Gideons and several members of the Christian Business Men's Committee of Oakville.

G. McAllister was the leader of the service. Stan Wright offered prayer and Tom Jeremiah delivered a sincere sermon on the subject of the visit of Nicodemus to Jesus by night. H. Routledge led the singing and Howard West played the accompaniment for the hymns. While the audience was assembling for the regular church service, the music of the organ in the chapel could be heard in the auditorium over the public address system. This music, played with beautiful expression by Bernard Shrubsole of the Manor staff, was greatly enjoyed. Mr. McAllister called on Warden D. Sargent at that time, who officially turned the chapel over to the Ministerial Association.

Dedication Service From the auditorium the congregation moved to the new chapel for the service of dedication. This beautiful little chapel with its communion table, pulpit and lectern and its lovely stained-glass windows, is circular in shape and seats 75 persons. The service was conducted by three ministers belonging to the Ministerial Association of Milton: Rev. D. A. Powell, rector of Grace Anglican church, Rev. J. L. Graham, minister of St. Paul's United Church and Rev. J. K. L. McGowan, minister of Knox Presbyterian Church.

Mr. Powell opened the service with prayer and a familiar hymn was sung. Two portions of scripture were read by Mr. Graham. These were part of chapter eight of the first book of Kings read as the scripture lesson from the Old Testament and part of chapter 21 of St. Matthew's Gospel as the scripture lesson from the New Testament. In the actual dedication of the chapel, Mr. McGowan read passages from the Bible and these were interspersed with prayers. Led by Mr. McGowan, the congregation repeated in unison the Apostles' Creed. When Mr. McGowan read the call to dedication, the congregation gave its consent by repeating the word "Amen" at appropriate intervals.

Then came a prayer for God's blessing on the newly dedicated chapel and this was followed by the Lord's Prayer recited in unison. At this point a very fine solo, "A Temple in the World," by Noel See, was sung by the well known radio singer, Wishart Campbell of Toronto, and was a beautiful addition to the reverent and impressive service just completed. Another familiar hymn was sung and the benediction pronounced by Mr. Graham. Mrs. R. Wright, the organist and choir leader at Knox Presbyterian church in Milton, was the tal-

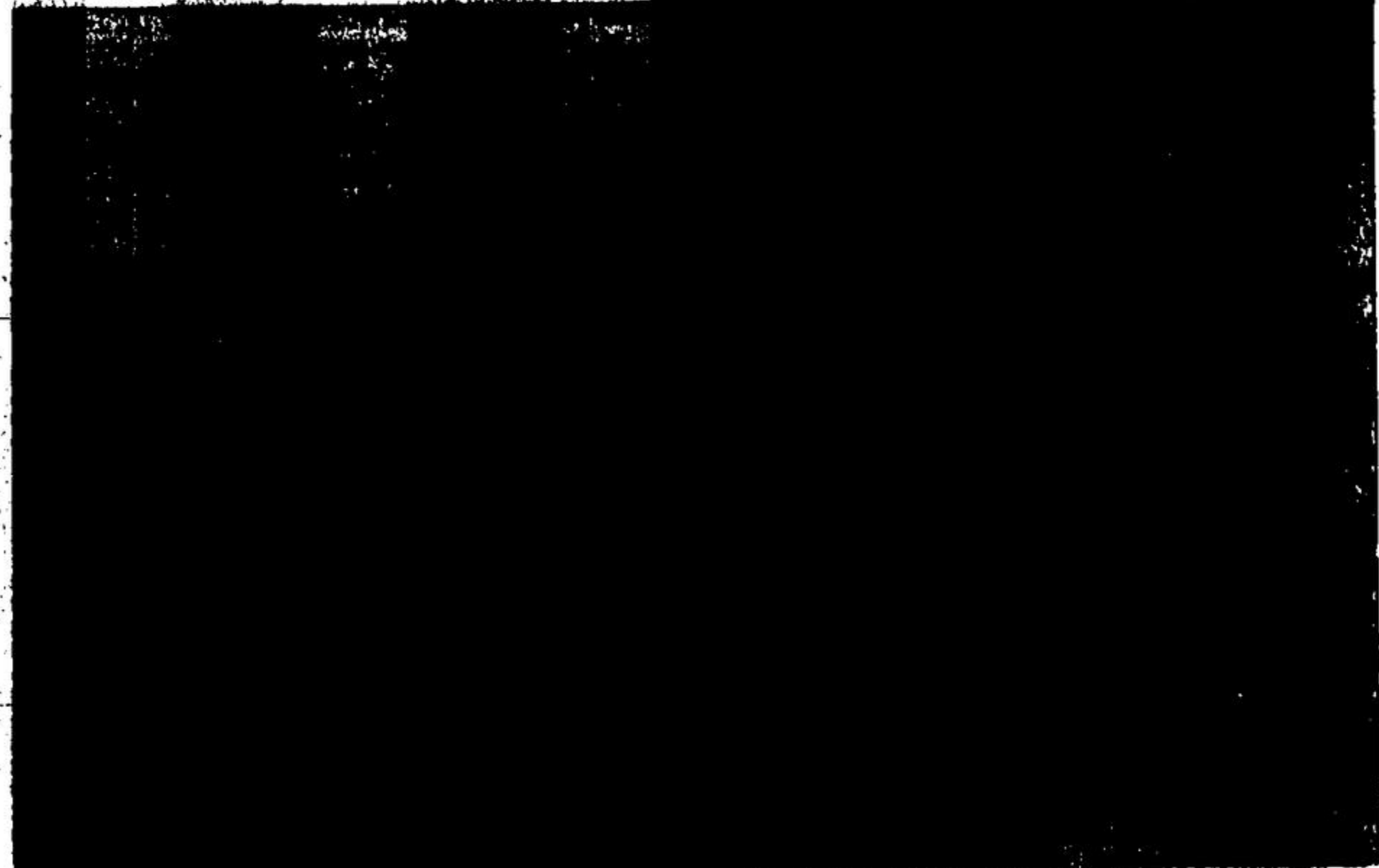
ented and accomplished organist for all the musical numbers in the service and the lovely organ that added so much to the beauty of the service had been loaned for this very special service by Paul Barber of Georgetown.

Many friends of the residents from Milton, Oakville, Georgetown and other points attended the service. These included Mrs. Mary Pettit, former Warden of the County of Halton, now Reeve of Milton; Regye Douglas Sargent, Warden of Halton County and Mrs. Sargent and Reeve Fred Tilly of Oakville, member of the Manor Board.

Band Concert Too From the chapel, the residents returned to the auditorium to attend a band concert played for them by the Oakville Citizens' Band, Bandmaster Frank Locksley conducting. This was a case of "old friends in new surroundings", for although the Oakville band has played many fine concerts for the residents through the years, this was the first occasion on which the band had played in the new auditorium. The numbers selected were some that had proved to be popular at the 25 band concerts that this band had played last summer. Since these numbers contained many favorite old songs, they were ideally suited to the taste of their listeners.

The program began with the stirring march, Under the Double Eagle, and closed with the lovely old hymn, Now the Day is Ended. Several medleys were played, among them The Charm of the Waltz, a medley of favorite old-time waltzes and a medley of Stephen Adams' compositions. The catchy popular song, The Naughty Lady of Shady Lane, written in honor of a nine-day-old baby, was also included.

The residents proved by their applause how glad they had been to see again these old friends in the Oakville Citizens' Band and how eagerly they would await more concerts throughout the winter months. Special Treats The residents have enjoyed two special treats recently. For two of their suppers they were served with delicious mushrooms donated by the Tangmere mushroom growers and the whole effect was most attractive. The residents gave a hearty round of applause at supper time in appreciation of both treats. The dining room itself was given a Halloween touch by means of a large Jack-O-Lantern made by the chef, E. A. Berg. ternoon, October 26. The entertainment took the form of a variety program and was given in the auditorium. The ladies who presented it were the members of the Women's Association of Ebenezer United church. Their minister, Rev. K. Griffiths and Mrs. Griffiths and Mr. Griffiths' brother, Clifford Griffiths, came with them. The president of the association, Mrs. A. Diamond, was also with them. The entertainment was convened by Mrs. M. Moffat, Mrs. K. Griffiths and Mrs. W. Dunbar.

The activities began with a warm greeting extended to the residents by Mrs. G. Thomas, speaking on behalf of the association. The program was then handed over to Mrs. K. Griffiths. Mrs. Clifford Griffiths took over at the piano and played a medley of well known rag-time tunes that set everyone's feet tapping. Many remarks of appreciation were heard at the close of the program and many wishes were expressed that these generous and gracious ladies would come back soon.

See Band Slides The residents of the Manor have enjoyed many fine band concerts played for them by the Lorne Scots Band and it was of particular interest and pleasure to them to see a great number of lovely colored slides depicting the part played by the pipes and drums of the band at the Edinburgh festival last summer. This was made possible by a visit to the Manor on Friday evening, October 28, by Captain Earl Lince, officer commanding C company of the Lorne Scots, who ran the projector for the showing of the slides and gave a

fluent and interesting commentary. Mrs. Lince was also a welcome visitor. Before going to Edinburgh to attend the festival, Captain and Mrs. Lince visited several beauty spots in Wales, the city of Dublin, Wicklow County, the city of Glasgow and the Burns country in Ayrshire. Very attractive colored slides of these localities were shown and these were followed by striking slides depicting the military tattoo at the festival in which the Lorne Scots played a very important part. The visit of the Lorne Scots to the Castle of Inverary, the ancestral home of the Duke of Argyll, was also shown.

From Edinburgh, Captain Lince took us by means of his slides to London where many historic places were visited and across the Channel to Belgium, Germany and Switzerland. From Switzerland the trip took us to Paris and Boulogne, back to England and home to Canada. After the showing of so many lovely slides, the residents feel their friendship with the Lorne Scots is stronger than ever and that much gratitude is due to Captain Lince for giving them such an enjoyable evening.

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725 Assessment Appeals

Halton Revision Court Sits

Halton's county court of revision last week began an estimated 23 days of sittings in the various municipalities, and expects to hear 725 appeals against local assessments. Hearings began Monday of last week in Milton, Tuesday in Nassagaweya and Wednesday in Esquimaux. The five-man court visits Acton on Nov. 16, Georgetown Nov. 17 and 18; Oakville Nov. 23, 25, 28, and 29, and Trafalgar Nov. 30 and Dec. 1, 2, and 5. Burlington appeals will be heard later and the dates set aside are Dec. 6, 7, 8, 12, 13, 14, 15, 19 and 20.

New Chairman Each Time Chairman of the court is appointed at each municipality. Board members are John Blair of Burlington, George Fish of Trafalgar, Col. G. O. Brown of Esquimaux, Alex. Neat of Nassagaweya and R. D. Fleming of Burlington. While there are 725 appeals against assessment, not all will be for a reduction of assessment values. County Assessor Paul Rogers pointed out that many are requests for changes from separate school supporters to public school supporters, and vice-versa.
