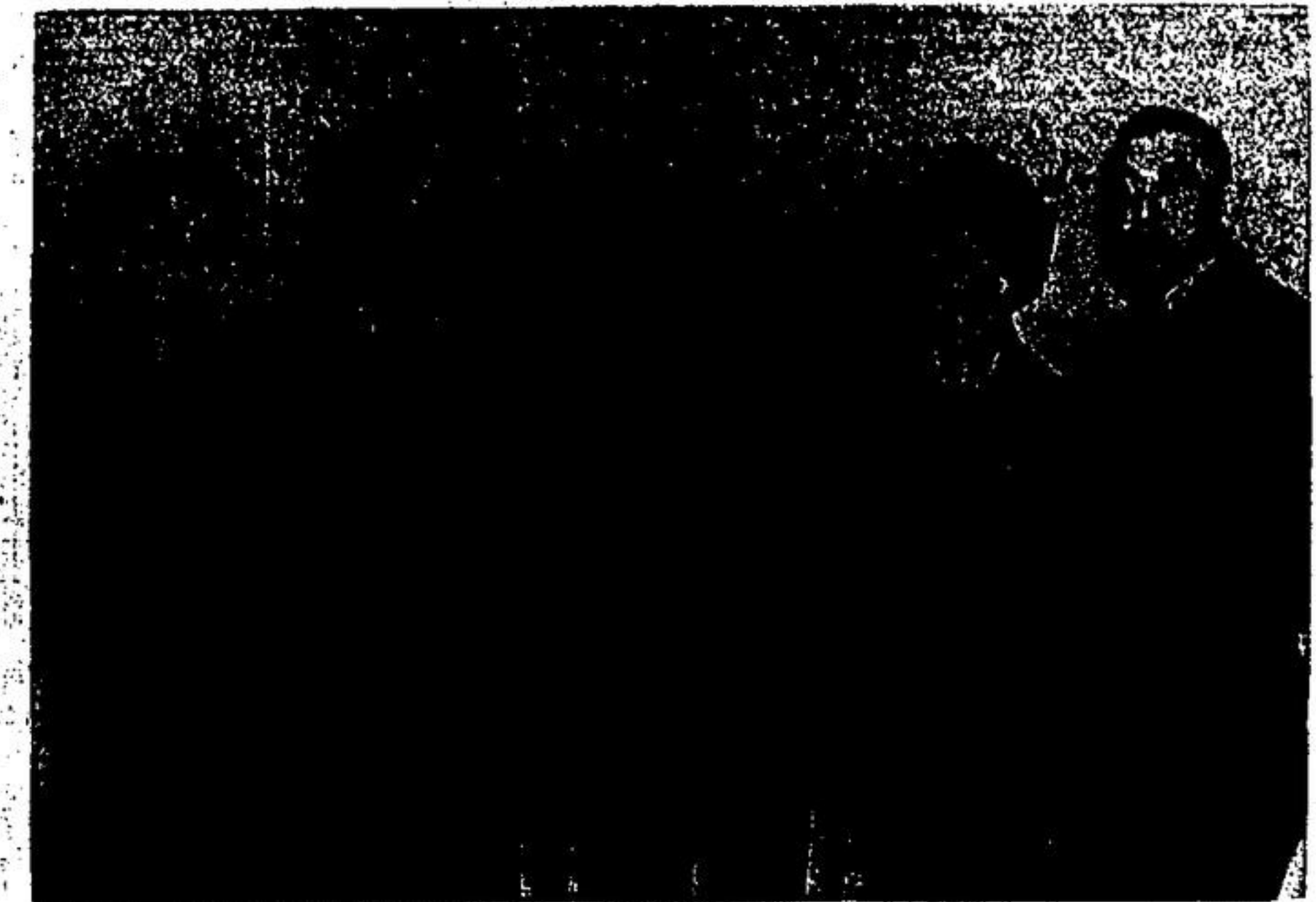

## County Producers Win Royal Awards

Haltoun County produced a fine showing in the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in Toronto, and brought back several trophies.

J. M. Pigott of Lazy Pat Farms, Palermo, won the Senior Yearling bull class on Dumar Farms Varro's Master and he was named Reserve Junior Champion.

I. L. Chisholm of Milton, placed second in the Senior Yearling bull class on Coldsprings Reliable King and placed third in the milking two year old class with Arawana Designers Nan.

Leonard W. Coulson of Milton won the grand champion bull and the reserve grand female titles with his Red Polls in beef cattle judging.

The Shorthorn title went to S. G. Bennett, Georgetown.

## Group Options Rattlesnake Pt.

At a recent meeting, the 12 Mile Creek Conservation Authority committed itself to nearly \$50,000 worth of property acquisition in Haltoun, Wellington and Wentworth Counties.

Most significant was the optioning of the Rattlesnake Point property on Burlington's Appleby Line just a few miles west of Milton. Plans call for 250 acres to be eventually set aside as open space conservation area, and the historic point will be left in its natural state. This district has been recommended by the Department of Planning and Development as one of the prime conservation areas between Hamilton and Toronto. Rare ferns have been found here that are unknown elsewhere.

**More Projects**  
At Morrison, plans were laid to make a seven acre community pond and alleviate a village drainage problem. Cost of this project is estimated at \$10,000 and while the property has not yet been acquired, plans are well underway.

A County forest is planned for a 52 acre tract in Nassagaweya Township in Lot 9, Con. 1. An option was taken for \$6,500.

The Authority is acquiring flood plain lands at Carlisle and some has already been optioned. An option was also taken up on a 43 acre reservoir site in Concession 14, East Flamboro. The Authority has optioned a 100 acre

reforestation site in Lot 12, Con. 1, Nassagaweya.

## Foods Can Give, Take on Odour

Sometimes someone will complain that the cheese, eggs or butter don't taste right. Such comments, even though they may be true, are disconcerting indeed for the homemaker who knows she purchased fresh produce which should still be acceptable to the most discriminating palate. The problem may be improper home storage, according to the information branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, since quite a few staple foods either give off or absorb odours.

Included in the group of foods which give off odours are fresh apples and peaches, cabbage, cheese, onions and potatoes. Those which absorb odours include fresh apples, butter, cheese, cornmeal, both dried eggs and fresh shell eggs, flour, rice and non-fat dry milk.

**Separate Them**  
Needless to say, such foods require careful storage. Even a carefully selected, high quality food item can be quickly lowered in quality by poor storage. Foods which give off odours should be separated from other stored foods. Fresh apples and cheese, which both absorb and give off odours, should be isolated as far as possible.

Cleaning equipment such as paints, oils, waxes, polishes, soap and mops, as well as wearing apparel, should never be stored near food areas.

## SLEEP ON IT

Heavy meals lead to heavy eyelids. To help keep alert the Ontario Safety League recommends you should eat easily digestible foods such as lean meat, eggs, and milk before and during long motor trips. Avoid heavy, fatty foods such as potatoes and cake sluggishness behind the wheel, which may induce drowsiness and
