

Halton, Wentworth Teachers' Institute Holds First Annual Meet in Hamilton

The first annual convention of the newly formed Halton No. 4, Wentworth No. 2 Teachers' Institute was held at Hamilton Teachers' College on Monday.

Rev. J. W. Oliver, Assistant Minister of Westdale United Church, conducted the devotional exercises. J. D. Londerville, M.A., M.Ed., Principal of the Teachers' College, welcomed the visiting teachers to the college. In his remarks, W. L. McNell, B.A., B.Ed., Inspector of Public Schools, stressed the importance of good public relations.

The following report of the nominating committee for the 1961 executive was accepted: president, R. Lung, Milton; vice-president, Mrs. E. Sheppard, West Flamboro; secretary, Mrs. K. The speakers for the morning session were Dr. William Lockington of Waterdown and his associate, Lincoln Alexander, a prominent Hamilton lawyer. They stressed the importance of the teachers' work in changing the attitude of the growing generation to tolerance and cooperation instead of the far too prevalent attitude of hate and fear. The speaker was introduced by G. Brickwood of Waterdown and thanked by Roy Johnston, East Flamboro.

The convention then broke up into 10 discussion groups for the remainder of the morning. At noon, the teachers assembled at the cafeteria of the Teachers' College for a turkey dinner. Head table guests were introduced by the new president, Raymond-Long.

J. D. Londerville, Principal of Hamilton Teachers' College gave a very fine address on the subject "Climbing Trees". It urged the teachers to nurture the child's natural love of poetry. G. McKenzie of Acton introduced Mr. Londerville and the appreciation of the group was voiced by Miss M. Downey of West Flamboro.

A highlight of the day was a short musical program presented by the Girls' Ensemble of Dalewood Public School.

During the afternoon, the teachers were conducted through the Planetarium, the Library, the new Divinity Building, and other points of interest at McMaster University.
