County Council Debates Uses of Old Court House

Proposed uses of both the new and the old Halton County Court House and administration building, were reviewed briefly Tuesday, November 15, at the November meeting of Halton County Council.

Magistrate K. M. Langdon submitted a plan to use the present building on Brown St., Milton for the entire county's Magistrate's Court and offices thus centralizing the facilities in Milton. The building committee recommended go immediate action on the request until further information is available.

Move Registry Office
The committee reported discussing the services which should be accommodated in the new building, slated for erection soon on a site on the Base Line north-east of Milton, and asked that the Registry Office be moved to this new building. Included in their plan is the moving of the County Health unit from a converted house, into the former Registry Office building.

The Milton Public Library Board requested accommodation in the present Court House when the new building is completed. The request will be considered later.

Good Exercise
Burlington Reeve F. I. Ryckman, noting a committee report that a proposal for ambulance service on a county basis has been turned down, wondered why the Civil Defence group could not take this over as a project. "I can't think of any better exercise than carting bodies off the Queen Elizabeth Way," he explained, and added that council could take advantage of Provincial grants if it was a C.D. scheme.

The proposal was referred to the committee.

Holiday periods and pay were set for all county employees in a by-law passed Tuesday. The holidays are one week with pay after six months' service, two with pay after one year, three after 10 years and four after 20 years, all effective January 1, 1960. The by-law also set out statutory holidays and Reeve Alex Phillips of Trafalgar wondered why Remembrance Day was not one of the holidays included in the list.

"Another Day Off"
Oakville Reeve Fred Tilley charged Remembrance Day was not a holiday, but just "another day off." Others felt it should be left up to the department heads, whether or not they wanted to give employees enough time off to attend a remembrance service. Only the two Trafalgar representatives favored a motion to include the holiday, so the debate was dropped.

Recalling no meetings of the planning committee this year,

Reeve Ryckman suggested either a meeting be called "just so we can sit and look at each other" or else disband the committee entirely. "We should try to foresee planning problems before they are in our laps," he suggested when another councillor noted there appeared to be no need for meetings this year.

The clerk was instructed to obtain a price on 60 County crests for members, and to obtain a discount purchase of navy blue blazers for councillors. The blazers are to be purchased by the individual members.

Truck Tender
The Civil Defence committee accepted the tender of Reed Motors, Milton at \$2,757 on a stake truck, and the committee approved of a resolution from Peel County requesting an increase in hospital grants from dominion and provincial governments.

A set of the 1960 Revised Statutes of Ontario was to be purchased at \$45, and accounts totaling \$67,532.25 were approved for payment.

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
