Montreal—For the second consecutive year the Bank of Montreal has been rated among the nine Canadian chartered banks and second among the 15,000 banks of North America for its advertising over the past 12 months. The standing is based on a survey of financial advertising conducted by Vincent Edwards and Co., New York, reported in the annual "Bank AdViews" review of Canadian and U.S. financial advertising. The Seattle First National Bank placed first among all North American banks. With the exception of only two years in the past 15, the B of M has been rated first among Canadian banks in the "Bank AdViews" survey and has received the "Socrates Award" each year.

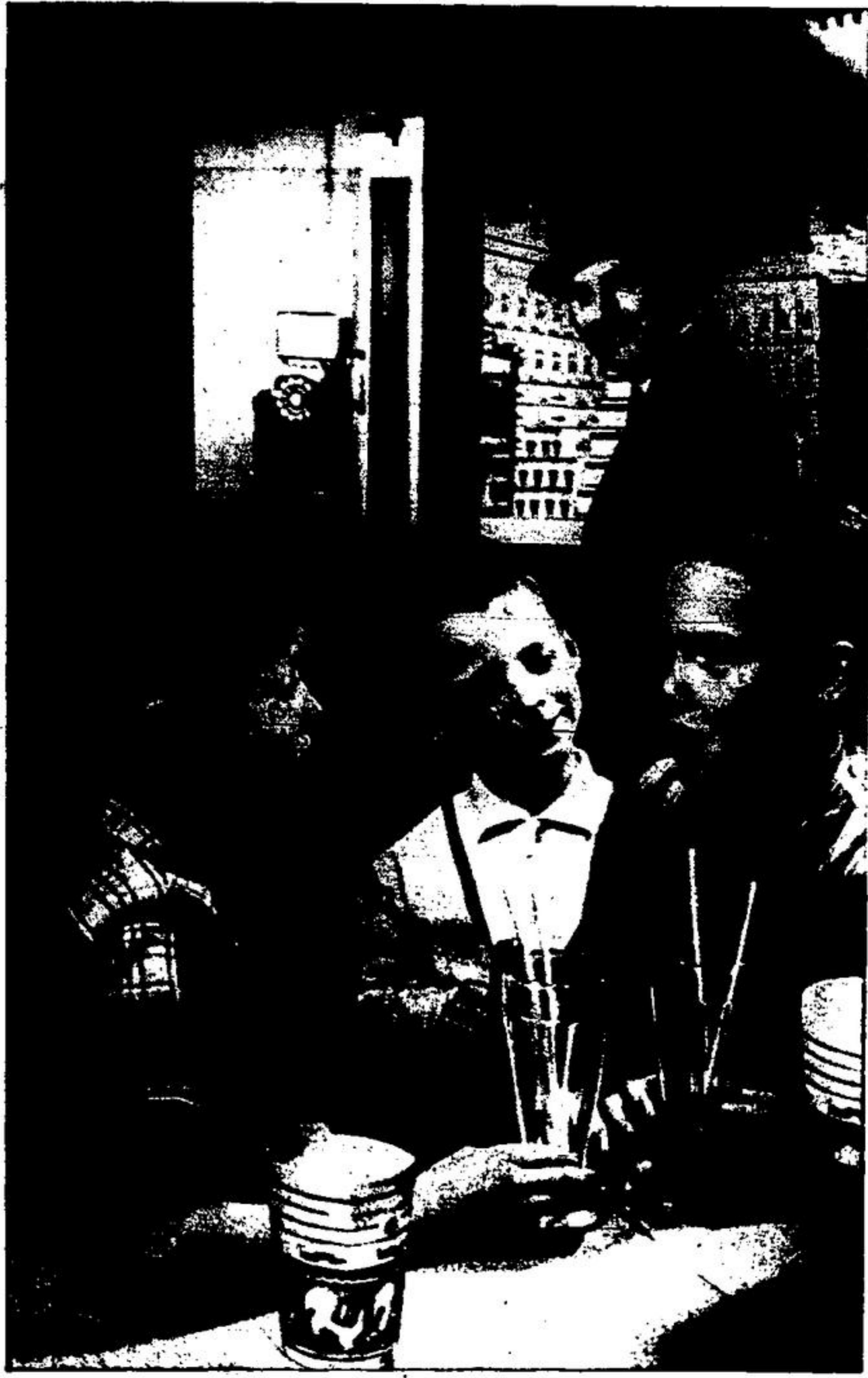
