List Safety Rules For Christmas Trees

The Industrial Accident Prevention Association of Ontario have listed the following rules for the care of Christmas trees to ensure a fire-safe Christmas:

Cut a growing tree or try to buy one that hasn't dried out from prolonged storage. (When too dry, the branches are brittle and shed needles easily.)

Stand the tree in water or snow outdoors until you're ready to use it indoors.

Bring the tree indoors just before Christmas and take it out as soon afterwards as possible.

(December 26th is recommended.)

The larger the tree the greater the hazard, so don't get one any larger than you need. Just before setting up the tree, saw of the trunk at an angle at least one inch above the original cut.

Place the freshly cut tree trunk in water and keep level of water above the cut the entire time the tree is indoors.
