The guest speaker is R. G. Bennett, chief agricultural officer for the Province of Ontario. Chairman for the evening will be Roy Coulter, president of the Halton 4-H club leaders' association.

At this time all awards are made to 4-H club members completing projects in Halton this year. One hundred and fifteen club members completed over 200 projects, in 11 clubs. The winner of each of these clubs is presented with a trophy, and the high member of each club who is not a previous winner, receives a Kiwanis scholarship provided by the Kiwanis Club of the Kingsway.

In recognition of members who have been active in club work over the years, award of merit certificates are presented to members when they have completed with 75% proficiency, either six
