## Farm Forum Studies World Food Shortage

Limestone farm forum gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Coulter on Monday evening (despite the zero weather) to study and discuss needs and methods of food distribution to starving nations. Everyone agreed that food should be made available to those who are starving but the problem of administration of such a project is beyond the common people.

All agreed with a statement of the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations: "What is needed is joint action in the international field, so that nations may join in concerted efforts to attack the common enemies of mankind—poverty, disease and hunger—instead of each attacking the other's prosperity in a futile effort to defend its own." It is each one's responsibility to make known his views on the subject and then action by our member of parliament would be the result, was the general consensus of opinion.

A film was shown, "War on Want", which was produced by the National Film Board and depicted what Canadians are doing through the Columbia Plan and UNESO in a program of material and to underdeveloped countries in South East Asia. Douglas Jackson, associate agricultural representative for Halton county, assisted with the showing.

## Marked U.S. Cards To Come Here Free

Postmasters in Canada have been authorized to deliver any Christmas cards marked postage due by United States postal authorities without the collection of any additional postage from the addressee. It was voted to day by the Postmaster General, the Hon. William Hamilton.

In announcing the news of Christmas cheer, Mr. Hamilton made it clear that he did not think it would increase the cost of postal services. "We are not playing Santa Claus," said he, "but maybe some Santa helpers."

### Failed to Cross

Last year many Canadian were disturbed to learn that some of the Christmas cards mailed in the United States failed to cross the border because they lacked sufficient postage. This Christmas the United States authorities have decided that any such "short paid" items which bear a return address will be returned to the sender. Those which do not will be taxed for postage and forwarded to Canada.

In order to avoid embarrassment to both the mailer in the United States and the addressee in Canada, Mr. Hamilton said, the additional postage will not be collected by the Canada Post Office.

### New Postal Rate

The Postmaster General pointed out that last year the United States postal service was employing a relatively new postage rate for unsighted Christmas cards and that, as a result, a large volume of "short paid" items were mailed. This year the new rates have been widely publicized in the United States and a much smaller volume of "short paid" cards is expected.

Mr. Hamilton said the move was an indication of the close cooperation between the Canadian and United States postal services, both of which were deeply concerned with giving the best possible service to patrons during the Christmas season.

## Something "Small," Something "Grand" Is Yule Gift Rule
