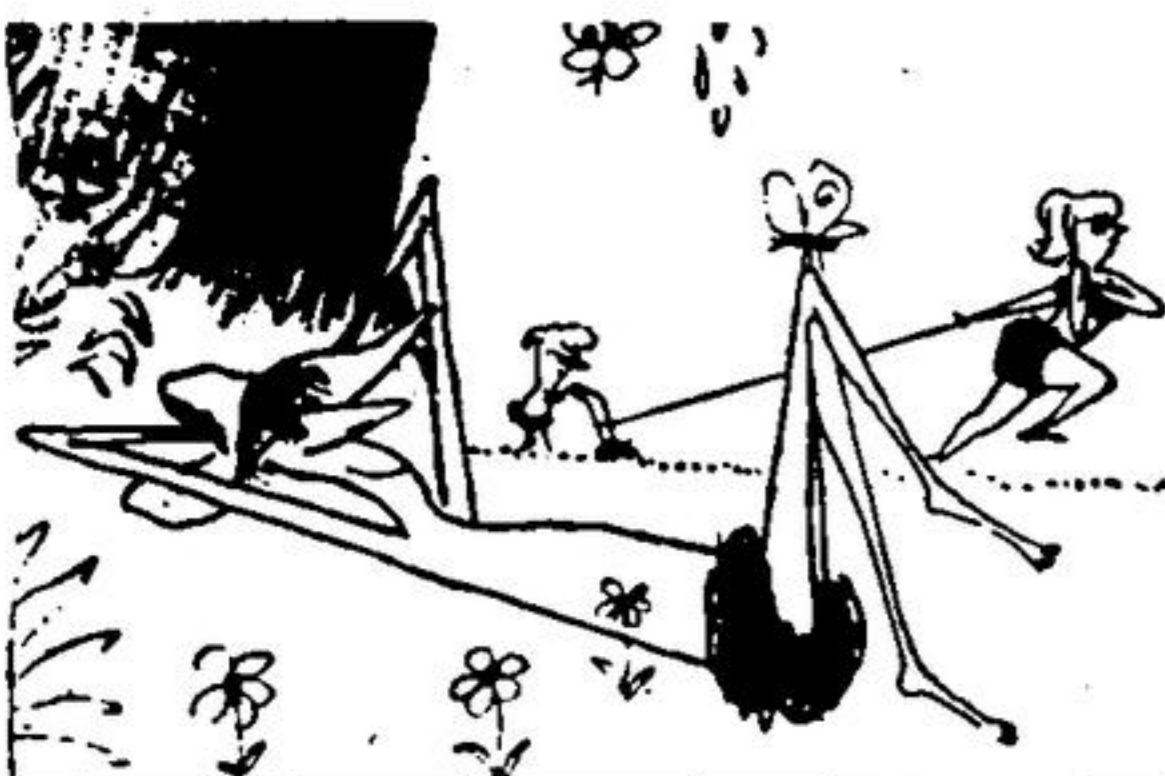
**Action Ladies**

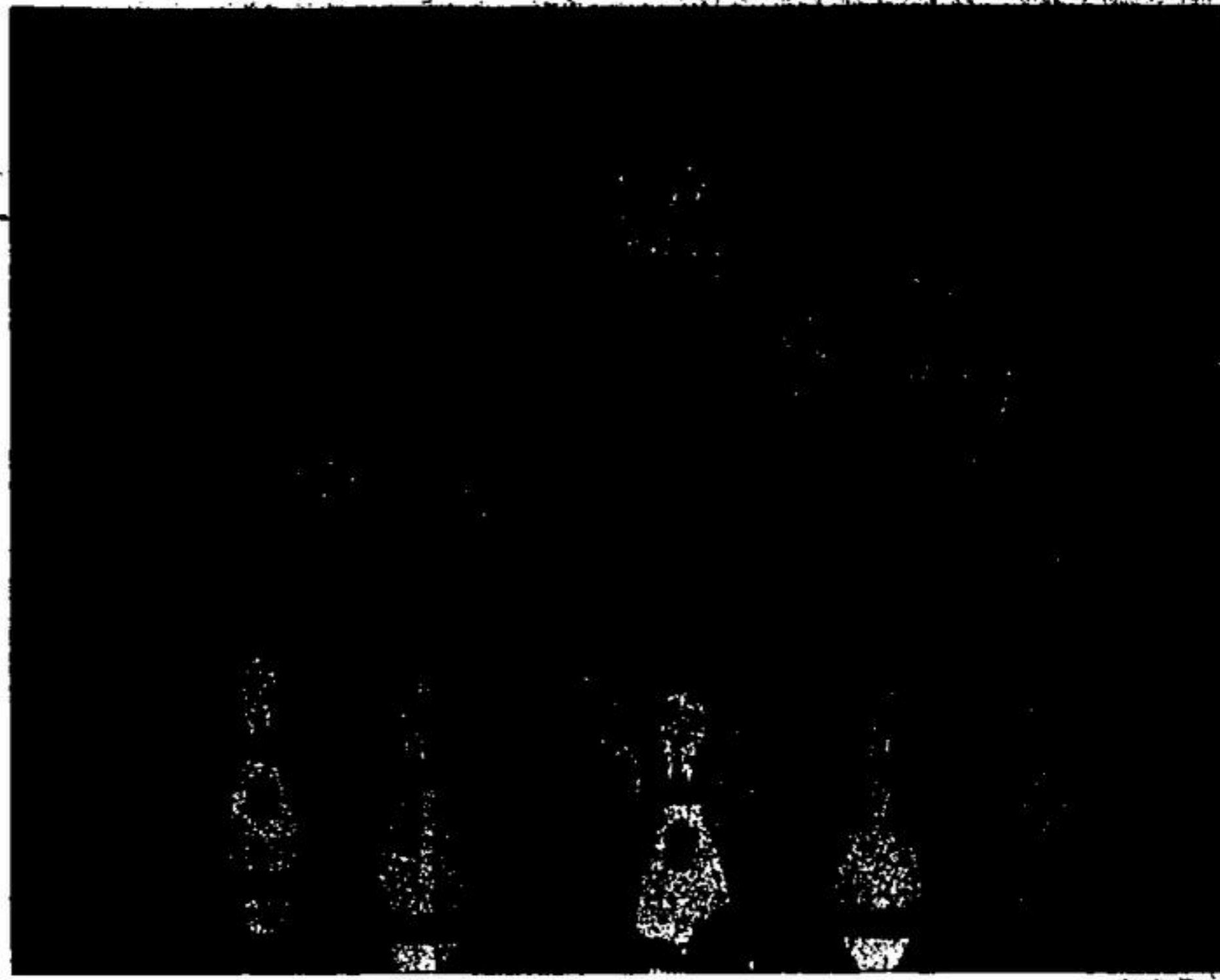
